Meteor Falls Near Bandon

What is now believed to have been a meteor striking the ocean off the local beach caused muffled report and caused houses to shake as in an earthquake or a heavy blast at about ten o'clock Wednesday evening. Numerous local people observed it but failed to give it much thought although some went so far as to go out onto their porches and see if anything happened nearby, says the Bandon World.

It was first considered by those who took pains to inquire that it was a slight earthquake shock, but inquiry on the part of Western World brings to light the fact that a large falling star was observed just before the report. It was a great ball of light that extended across the heavens from east to west and apparently disappeared into the ocean. The light of the meteor attracted attention and caused comment as it was so much

more intense than the ordinary falling star so frequently observed here on a clear night.

The theory advanced is that the meteor struck comparatively close to the shore and that the compact jarred the ledge of rock upon which Bandon is situated. This caused the shake, while the report was caused from the hot ball of fire striking the water.
