Case of State vs. Stoll

In an exhaustive opinion, J. J. Stanley this week passed on the case of the State vs. W. T. Stoll for allowing his fourteen-year-old son to operate his car. The judge found him guilty as charged, but he has not yet passed sentence.

In his opinion Mr. Stanley holds that the statute of 1921 is not unconstitutional because of defective title. The law is described as regulatory in the title, but the prohibition as to children under 16 years acting as motor car operators, the judge holds, is in fact also a matter of regulation for the safety of others and cannot be held as conflicting with the law's title.

As to the fact that the mother, in the case at trial, was really the operator, the boy being under her control, Judge Stanley says that the law is specific in requiring that an operator must have a license and that licenses cannot be granted to children under 16. As an illustration of how it might work out, should the occupant of the front seat of a car who was not at the wheel be claimed as the operator, the following is cited: The owner of a car could secure any one to drive for him, whether the latter had ever been behind a steering wheel before or not, and claim to be the operator. The judge held that as not the correct view to take of the law.

Mr. Stoll has announced his intention of carrying the case higher.

Mild in New York

Before Mrs. R. A. Wernich left for their new home in Poughkeepsie, N. Y., last fall, she was told by this writer that the Hudson valley had the hottest weather in summer and the coldest in winter of any we had experienced anywhere in the United States. This was said after two seasons of each spent about 40 miles above New York.

Yast Saturday a copy of the Poughkeepsie Evening Star was received from Mrs. Wernich, which contained a story entitled "Open Winter Still Rules," and stated that only once had the thermometer dropped to the zero point this winter and that roses were in full bloom in the open and crocus plants were peeping above the ground.

Health Meeting

Health Meeting
Through the able efforts of Mrs. A. W. Bell a very successful health program was carried out last Friday evening. The meeting was well attended and the program enjoyed. The opening number consisted of a community "sing" of several old favorites.

Miss Ruddick, a guest of Mrs. Geo. Chaney and recently from New Jersey, gave a talk on her experiences in tuberculosis work. Miss Eismann told of health conditions of the county and related some of the inconveniences and misunderstandings a county nurse has to experience. Miss Horn read an article on the care of the teeth.

The girl scouts gave an interesting demonstration of first aid work. Miss Nisson rendered two selections on the cello. Rev. C. S. Bergner and J. Russell Morgan favored the audience with solos. Mrs. M. O. Hawkins and Miss Genevieve Chase presided at the piano.

Mr. Bergner related some of the plans of the boy scouts and urged co-operation.

Mrs. Inez Chase gave a summary of health conditions of the receiving class found last fall by the county health doctor and nurse at the time that the physical examination was made: Of the 42 pupils examined, not one was reported underweight sufficiently to get a red card, which signifies "danger." Seventeen were given blue cards with gold stars representing those pupils as normal in every respect. The others had slight defects of teeth or tonsils in most instances. One pupil, only, had defective skin and was sent home. The children of this class were also reported as having the cleanest and best kept teeth of any class in that building.

In marked contrast to this, is the report of thirty in the beginning class in a school up the coast, where the nurse found twenty-six underweight, three over weight and one normal. The credit for the excellent health condition cannot be claimed by the teachers but is due to the care exercised by the mothers during the preschool year.
