Student Body Meeting

Very good arguments were stated by members of the student body. Some wished fifty cents to be the price of this year's "Laurel," others were in favor of seventy-five cents, but the majority considered that fifty cents wasn't an appropriate price as it would tend to cheapen the book.

Allen Young made a motion to the effect that the price be seventy-five cents. This motion was immediately seconded. The majority agreed that seventy-five cents was a good price, being a happy medium, which would not altogether cheapen the book but would give everybody in High School a chance to buy one if they desired it.

We expect to publish a better book this year than last and the reason for the lower price is that the funds of the school are sufficient to carry it through without the price of a dollar, which was previously charged.

A motion was also made and seconded that when the students pay their student body fees of twenty-five cents they also pay twenty-five cents down on the "Laurel," and also twenty-five cents for any additional ones desired; thus making it compulsory that everyone who is a member of this student body buy a "Laurel." This is an entirely new plan but the success of it seems assured.

Bills amounting to one dollar and fifteen cents were allowed upon motion.

Adjournment followed by word of the president.

The meeting was a success and a great deal of enthusiasm and pep was shown by the pupils in attendance.
