### Russell Hecker to Hang

Russell Hecker convicted of the killing of Frank Bowker, a Portland musician, April 17, 1922, was sentenced the first of the week by Judge Campbell at Oregon City to be hanged Wednesday, May 21, between ten a. m. and 4 p. m. Hecker, a youth formerly of Albany, confessed to killing Bowker while in an automobile en route to a liquor cache.

Hecker was formerly employed in Marshfield as a movie picture machine operator. He spent several months there a few years ago. He was a red-headed chap and known to many.

Bowker, his victim, also resided in Marshfield, being employed there as a barber and violinist during the shipyard days. Later both went to Portland. Bowker engaged in bootlegging there, using his violin case in which to carry bottles of liquor until he was picked up by officers.
