 Voters in a special election at Roseburg Wednesday authorized the city council to issue up to \$18,000 in bonds to acquire a city library, and selected the home of A. C. Marsters as the site for the institution. The library bonds carried by a vote of 446 to 181, and the Marsters site won over the lot offered by the Woman's club, 361 to 258.

The council will proceed as rapidly as possible to purchase the Mar-

sters home site and remodel the residence into a public library. The yard will be converted into a rest park in the heart of the business district.
