When I was new to Coos county, Guss Bennett, of the Coos Bay News, was the man who gave me the understandable information about the county, for he knew it from A. to Z.

But the picture of Guss Bennett that will always stick in my mind is the man as I saw him this last time standing by his press working out a job of printing.

Artist of the years has not left grievous lines upon him, his countenance is more rugged, his hair and mustache a sandy iron gray but his eyes carry the same friendly smile. And while his body may have lost some of its weight his frame, his head, his height as he stood by that hand printing press, dressed in trousers, shirt and galloos, it was rubbed in on me that he is one of the enduring kind of men. It is in my head, that if I werea publisher of a magazine or a newspaper that I would make a picture of that man as I saw him standing by his printing press and it would have a place on the front page.

"The Germans as a whole are paying less taxes than the French, English or Americans.

"Germany, if she shouldered the total reparations bill, would have a smaller war debt than if she had won the war without indemnities."
