An Octogenarian
J. L. Barker, a pioneer of 1852, celebrated his 80th birthday, at the home of his son, E. C. Barker, in Myrtle Point, on Tuesday, April 8. Those present were his daughter, Mrs. Birdie Hazelton, and children, and his son, E. C. Barker, and family, both of whom reside in Myrtle Point, and a grand child, the daughter of his son, C. A. Barker, of Dora.

Mr. Barker was born in Misosuri in 1844. He crossed the plains in 1852 with his parents in an ox caravan, starting for the territory of Oregon, then spoken of as the Great Northwestern territory. On the way across cholera broke out in the train and his father was among those who died. His father in all probably overtaxed his strength, working among the train people, as he was a physician. This changed the course of the train into California and in the fall of '52 they landed at Suisun, with his mother and five sisters and three brothers.

In 1861, at the age of 17, Mr. Barker came to Oregon, stopping at Eugene for a while. Here he met with cattle men, who were driving a herd of cattle to Walla Walla and he joined them on their trip. At Walla Walla he rigged up an ox team and freighted into Lewiston, Idaho, the head of navigation and roads to the mines. On one of the trips with freight he went into the mines at Florence, Idaho. This camp boasted of being the roughest of any in the west, having a man for breakfast nearly every morning during the mining excitement. At that time Florence boasted of not having a grave in their cemetery from natural causes.

On returning from Florence to The Dalles he ran a pack train to Canyon City. On these trips his party had many skirmishes with the Indians, who were all along the trail to rob the miners and steal their stock.

In 1870 he came to Coos county, where he was married in 1871 and has since resided. Mr. Barker is hale and hearty at his age of 80 and is a very interesting person to converse with about the early days of the Northwest.

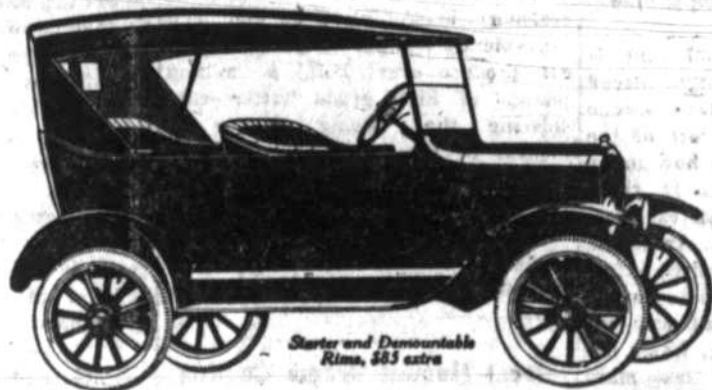
