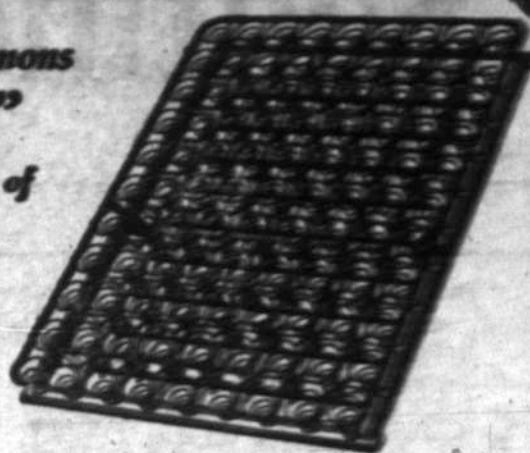

He Was Well Fumigated

Charles Feller, of Marshfield, who has just returned from a month's auto tour in California, says he must have undergone fumigation seventy-five times during the trip, on account of the foot and mouth disease. A total of nearly 50,000 animals have been destroyed in that state since the epidemic began, resulting in a loss of over \$2,000,000.

Protecting Oregon

Dr. W. W. Glazier thanks the Sentinel for the following from the proclamation by Gov. Stone regarding protective measures against the foot and mouth disease against importations into Oregon from the state of California. With the foot and mouth disease appearing in seven new localities as it did the first of the week in California and the disease spreading as it is, there cannot be too strict a quarantine to prevent its getting a foothold in the dairy herds of Coos county.

All automobiles moving from the State of California into the State of Oregon shall stop at patrol stations at or near the state line and submit all passengers, baggage and material carried therein to an inspection, disinfection or fumigation as determined necessary by the patrol officers in charge. All persons entering the State of Oregon from the State of California in any manner whatsoever shall be required to comply with any and all disinfection or fumigation requirements, regardless as necessary to protect against the entrance of foot and mouth disease infection.

All railroads, stages, boats or other common carriers shall be required to subject any and all baggage carried by passengers moving from any foot and mouth disease infected territory in California into Oregon to a six-hour formaldehyde gas fumigation, and certificate must be issued.

During the existence of this quarantine the transportation, movement, trailing, driving or the importation in any manner whatsoever of the following animals, materials or commodities from the State of California into the State of Oregon is prohibited:

- (a) All animals, excepting man.
- (b) All dressed carcasses of animals, including freshly smoked and salted meats and raw meat food products.
- (c) All hay, straw and similar fodder, including all plant origin packing materials.
- (d) All dairy products, including milk, butter, cheese, etc., and milk utensils.
- (e) All nursery and greenhouse products, such as trees, flowers, shrubs, bulbs, etc.
- (f) All raw farm products, such as vegetables, fruits, beans, peas, rice, etc.
- (g) All poultry and poultry products, including day-old chicks and used egg crates.
- (h) All commercial food stuffs, including animal grain, still feeds, seeds in sack or bulk, copra, beet pulp, etc.
- (i) All packing house by-products, including all fertilizers, bone meal, etc.
- (j) All bees and bee products.
- (k) All hides, pelts, skins, wool, wild and domestic animal hair and manure, used or second-hand manure.

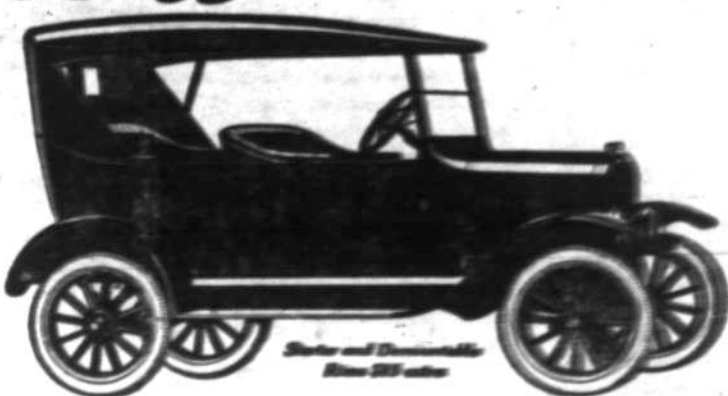
