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PRIMARY FIGURES

Results of the Election in Coos County Last Week— No Surprises

There were very few surprises in the primary elections held last Friday, although those contests in which the result was close were doped to go either way.

Coolidge carried Oregon for president over Hiram Johnson by a majority of about four to one.

For vice president, ex-Gov. Lowden, of Illinois, received a plurality over Geo. Shepherd of Oregon.

Senator McNary was renominated by more than a two to one majority over Mayor Geo. L. Baker, of Portland.

Milton A. Miller was nominated for U. S. senator on the democratic ticket by a plurality of less than 400.

Congressmen W. C. Hawley and N. J. Sinnott were both renominated.

In local county politics Chas. Hall, for state senator, was never in doubt and he led the county ticket where real contests occurred.

Dal M. King was nominated for representative from Coos county, S. P. Peirce from Coos and Curry counties, Edw. P. Ellingsen for sheriff, J. B. Bedingfield for district attorney, and M. H. Klockars for county commissioner.

Good Roads Association Tuesday

The annual meeting of the Coos County Goods Roads Association has been called to meet in the Hotel Coquille next Tuesday evening, May 27, at 6:30 o'clock. Officers for the year will be chosen at that time as well as representatives to represent the association at meetings of the Highway Commission this year.

It is probable also that a plan will be initiated at that time looking toward a bond issue for providing funds for matching the state and federal government on the 50-50 basis.

Had the bond measure voted on last week provided only for funds to pay Coos county's share for the completion of the Coos Bay Highway near Myrtle Point, for the completion of the Roosevelt Highway between Coquille and Bandon, and for the same highway north of the Bay, it would have carried by a large majority. The county must meet its obligations to the state, and the voters are willing to vote bonds to do it, but they were not willing to approve the plan which private interests had been able to inject into the proposed bond issue just voted down.

With the Good Roads Association and every good roads booster in the county working for it, there is little doubt but that a bond issue, for necessary match money, will be voted this fall, if put on the ballot.

BONDS LOST BY 168 VOTES

As had been anticipated the proposed bond issue was defeated at the election last Friday, although it came much nearer carrying than most people thought it would. The official canvass shows that 2567 votes were cast for the measure and 2785 against, an adverse majority of 168.

The following shows how the precincts in the south end of the county lined up. Beaver Hill, Coaledo and the southwest Coquille precinct were the only ones to cast a majority in their favor, while at Four Mile and at Parkersburg not a single vote favored the issue:

Fined \$100 for Bootlegging

He said he had no funds to pay it and was willing to work on the streets at \$2 a day for fifty days but within an hour friends had raised the money and he was released.

Grading High School Grounds

E. A. Wimer and a crew of six or seven men were put to work at the high school grounds Tuesday by the school board. The board decided to do the work by day work and secured Mr. Wimer for superintendent. All the brush and trees along the highway have been grubbed out and the earth is being moved back from the point at the street intersection and the whole slope is being terraced down to the highway level.

THEIR NEW STORE

New Busy Corner One of the Best in the State of Oregon

J. E. Norton took a half hour off yesterday morning and showed the Sentinel scribe through the new Busy Corner building into which they expect to move soon after June 1.

A general idea of the arrangement of any grocery store is held by everyone, but the Busy Corner has been planned to give the maximum of service with the least effort and to provide the utmost in convenience for the clerks and those waiting on trade.

Separate counters for each clerk just back of the middle of the room, with access to the delivery chute, the McCaskey and cash registers, and with the smaller articles which form a part of most orders close at hand, will enable them to wait on trade and get their orders out much more quickly.

The shelving along the walls will not be obstructed by long show cases, but small individual glass cases will be scattered over the front of the room where most convenient.

Enamelled metal containers for citrus fruits, etc., small stands for the hundred and one things which must be displayed, and with a place for everything, there is no doubt that the Busy Corner will have as well arranged a store as can be found in Oregon. It has been reported to them that their general arrangement is very similar to the grocery department of Meier & Frank's.

The room has two large skylights over the clerks' counters and fifteen ceiling lights will provide all the light needed and more too.

The curved effect where the side walls and ceiling merge are an unusual departure in a mercantile establishment but it enhances the beauty of the interior.

The show windows at the front are to be glass enclosed, with a fountain to spray water over tender vegetables and ample protection from the warmth of the room.

The building is 50x100, giving them five feet more of width than the old building had, and much more depth.

The twenty feet at the back has been devoted to office and rest room, several feet above the level of the store room. The rest room is to be comfortably fitted with chairs, telephone and other conveniences, and windows on the west will permit its occupants to observe the docking or departure of the river boats. A lavatory and toilet opens off this room.

The office has been arranged for convenience and will have swinging windows opening into the main room.

Besides the delivery chute (all freight and deliveries will pass through the basement, there is a stairway and a hydraulic lift giving access to the warehouse below. The entire basement has been concreted and will permit the storage of \$20,000 worth of merchandise, of the general run of grocery stock.

Feed and hay is the only line that will not be housed in the concrete building and that will be carried in the basement of their old building, where four or five carloads of feed can be stored.

An engine room, a weighing room, with dial scale, a vegetable room, an unpacking bench and a sorting table are others of the many conveniences and necessities of this lower floor.

The unloading room has been constructed with doorway sufficiently high to permit the largest freight van to back in and unload out of the rear.

Mr. Norton estimates that when finished the building will represent an investment of \$12,000, but according to what the travelling salesmen tell them, there will be nothing superior to it between San Francisco and Portland.

There are many other items on which we have not touched but enough has been detailed to give an idea of how effective the new quarters are going to be in enabling them to render service to their customers.

A report from the Bay states that Wm. G. Barrow, who recently returned California after the death of his father, C. R. Barrow here, has leased the Marshfield Service Station and will take charge June 1. Mr. Barrow has been an auditor for one of the large oil corporations, and lived near San Francisco.
