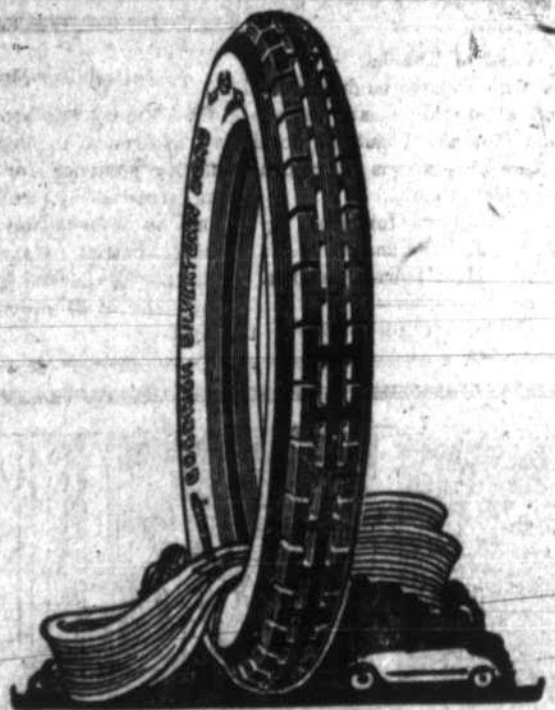

The organization of a huge selling agency to handle the northwest's five million dollar prune crop is under way. It is a federation of the growers of Oregon and Washington. The crop will be graded, standardized and sold collectively under modern marketing systems. Its success very largely depends on management. There is plenty of room between what the grower gets for the fruit and what the consumer pays for it for higher prices to producers and lower prices to consumers. If the organization will cut out many of the middle handlers and their profits and sell direct to the big chain stores and other like retailers, the prune industry may again become profitable to the northwest.

Buy a Big Site

The state board of control this week authorized the purchase of 276 acres along the Pacific highway, one mile east of Woodburn, as a site for the new state training school for boys.

Governor Pierce and Secretary of State Koser favored it over the negative vote of State Treasurer Myers.

The purchase price is \$37,000 and construction of the institution will start immediately, board members said.

Airplane Fire Patrol in Oregon

Airplane forest fire patrol will be established at Eugene, Ore., just as soon as arrangements for equipment and personnel can be made, Senator McNary was assured Wednesday by Secretary of War Weeks and Colonel William C. Greeley, chief of the forest service. Three planes will be placed at the disposal of the patrol, says a Wednesday's special in yesterday's Oregonian.

Appeals for airplanes to scout over the large forest areas of western and central Oregon and northern California have been reaching Washington for two or three weeks. The drought, it was represented, called for every possible measure of protection from fire.

The large quantity of valuable standing timber in that section, Secretary Weeks and Colonel Greeley felt, warranted them in ordering the establishment of such a patrol, the only one likely to be put in service this year due to lack of both planes and personnel.
