Hammering Bert Fitchner, who has had the jinx on Coquille teams for two years, the local all home team last Sunday touched him for ten safe hits, scored eight runs and won the game by a wide margin. Score 8 to 3.

Five of their eight runs were earned, and they hit safely in all but two innings.

Gilbert, the Coquille pitcher, who is unbeatable when right, had the visitors eating out of his hand and he was most stingy when they threatened. Three runs, four hits and two walks tells the tale. Only one of their runs was earned. His support was not perfect, but on the whole it was a very good game which showed the fans the kind of ball the team is capable of.

The Marshfield bunch did a lot of razzing the umpire, but as Spike Leslie was on top of every play and called them just as he saw them, there was really no ground for their kicking. Especially loud did Bill Wilson wail when he was called out for cutting first base by several feet. "Spike" saw it and called him out when requested to do so.

Three errors, a stolen base, a hit and a wild pitch gave Coquille three unearned runs in the first inning. In the fourth Marshfield scored two, and in the fifth tied it up on two hits and an error, but Gilbert tightened and struck out the next two.

In the sixth and seventh, Coquille amassed six hits, one of them a double by Harry Dement, and put the game on ice with five runs.

A very fair crowd witnessed the contest, the gate being \$168.

Powers won from North Bend Sunday by a score of 7 to 5 at the Bay.
