That was a tough game for Coquille to lose last Sunday at the Bay after they had come from behind and tied the score in the eighth and put across what should have been the winning run in the tenth.

Gilbert and Moe both pitched brilliantly and it was the best game played so far this season, with very few errors, although it was Roselle's error in the tenth which enabled Marshfield to put across the tying run after Feightinger had doubled, and it was an error in judgment which caused Dement to throw to first, when there was only one out in the same inning, on Burke's sacrifice grounder, with Duvall on third and ready to score the winning run on the play, which he did.

"Red" Rupert as umpire had an unusual off day for him, changing a decision once; but his worst error of judgment was in the sixth inning when Cliff Perkins hit the ball in such a way that it bounced from home plate and came down outside the foul lines. Feightinger tagged Perkins and "Red" called him out, when in reality was an uncaught foul. It may have prevented Coquille from winning for Dement would have scored a moment later on a passed ball and the two scores in the eighth would have prevented the game going into extra innings.

It was a tense game from the fan's point of view and the most cheering part, from the Coquille standpoint, was the way Gilbert stood the heavy Marshfield hitters on their heads. He struck out fourteen of them.

North Bend did its part in tying the league by winning from Powers, 4 to 3, and those two teams are now tied for second place.

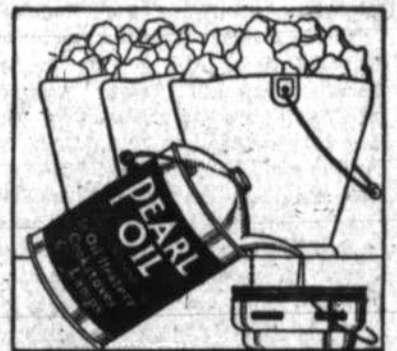
Roosevelt Highway in Douglas

E. Chandler, division engineer of the state highway department, F. C. Frear, roadmaster, and Ed. Weaver, commissioner of Douglas county, were at Gardiner Wednesday for the purpose of estimating the cost of building three miles of the Roosevelt highway from the north bank of the Umpqua river, through Gardiner to the summit of the mountain north of Gardiner. A delegation of Gardiner business men and the Douglas county commissioner met with the state highway commission in Portland on June 12. This was the first move made by Douglas county towards the building of the Roosevelt Coast highway.—Reedsport Courier.

North Bend Pioneer Dead

E. P. Briles, a pioneer resident of North Bend, died Tuesday of pneumonia, following a short illness, at the age of 77. Mr. Briles had been a resident of Coos county for the past 48 years. For a time he was engaged in ranching north of the Bay but recently had resided in Bangor where he maintained a bachelor home. He was born in Indiana. He is survived by a sister, Mrs. Cantine, and a niece, Miss Fern Peterson, of North Bend. A brother resides in Alabama.
