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Bandon District Adrift

The recent Union High School election, on the question of dissolution, has thrown the district boundary board into a worse deadlock and confusion than the Democratic convention at New York, says the Bandon World.

The election is without effect until the district boundary board makes a canvass of the election, and declares the result.

The board was in doubt as to the irregularities of certain notices, in some of the outlying districts, and referred the matter to Deputy District Attorney Coleman, who is acting in the absence of Ben Fisher.

Mr. Coleman has raised the question that the district was created as provided by law by a majority of the entire district, as well as a majority in the majority of the districts, and now the attempt is being made to declare the entire district dissolved by a majority of votes in a majority of the districts only, without taking into consideration the wish of the entire Union High school district as a whole.

The district attorney is undecided, and an S. O. S. call has been sent out to interested attorneys all over the county who have been delving into the law for the last two days to throw some light on the matter.

The district boundary board has about reached the conclusion to do nothing until an opinion is forthcoming from Salem, as to what is the proper decision to make.

Meantime the entire situation is up in the air, and no immediate decision of result is in sight.—Bandon World.

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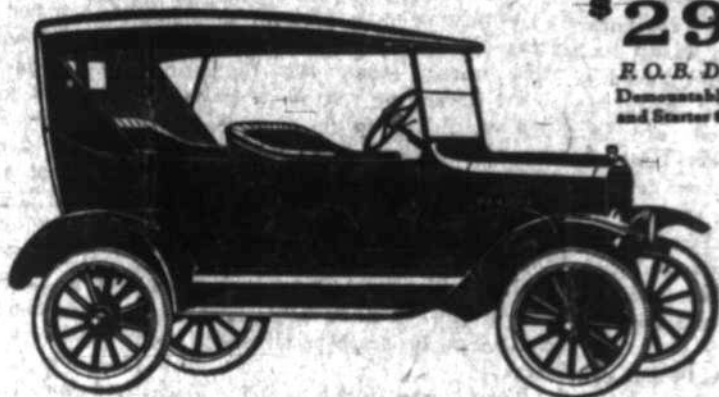
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
