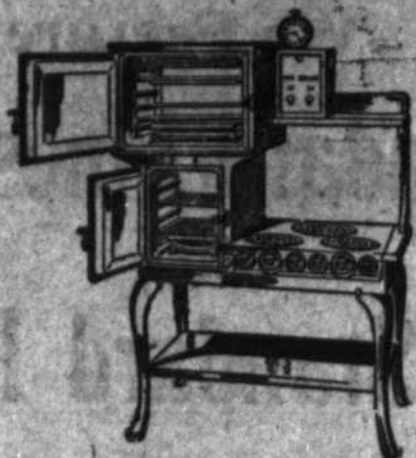

Priscilla Medlock was born in Cole county, Mo., Feb. 19th, 1848. She died at the home of her daughter at Fishtrap July 11th, 1924, being 76 years, 4 months and 22 days old at the time of her death. She was married to G. T. Robison in Cole county, Missouri, Dec. 7th, 1871.

To this union were born four children, of whom three are living, George P., and James Robison and Mrs. Eva Hickam, all of the Fishtrap section. The oldest child died in infancy. The family came to Coos county in 1888, settling at Fishtrap, and have lived there ever since, only being away a few months at a time.

She was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church South nearly all her life and was a good Christian woman, ready to go to the home prepared for those who love their Lord.

Aunt Priscilla—as she was lovingly called by so many—will be missed by many more than just the family.

The funeral services were held at the Fishtrap Methodist church Sunday, July 13th, at 1 p. m. Rev. H. M. Benham, her pastor, preached the funeral sermon to a large congregation of friends. Her body was laid to rest in Fishtrap cemetery to await the resurrection of the just.
