Serious Water Problem at Bay

The following from Monday's Daily News tells some results of the prevailing drought at the Bay:

In an effort to safeguard as far as possible the water supply of the cities of Marshfield and North Bend, the Coos Bay Water company Saturday evening closed the roads leading to the pumping station on lower Pony creek below the new storage reservoir.

Protests were promptly made by property owners in the territory served by the roads, but permission to enter the watershed must be obtained from the water company, it was said.

Use of spring water by residents of both cities continues although it has been pointed out that no tests are being made of this water to determine if it is free from germs, while the city supply is tested every week.

Shipments of Bull Run from Portland, brought to this city for use in confectioners' stores, have been ordered discontinued by the Portland water bureau, but petitions are in circulation here asking that the ban be raised.

Construction of a number of new wells in North Bend has been begun by individuals.

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
