It is a great day when the children come home. E. W. Hyde, of Oakland, their father, is due to arrive Saturday afternoon for a week's vacation and visit.

The report is that there was opposition to the closing of the Chanay dam at Minard's mill Monday night and the dam was not closed. Some of the farmers below were afraid of their banks being washed, when dam would be opened.

Ira Howe, his wife, Silvia, and daughter, Betty, left for their Portland home Monday morning. He is a baggage man in the Union depot and work commences the minute vacation ends.

E. E. Howe and sister, Mrs. Rosina Gilmore, left for their home in Portland Tuesday morning. They are interesting people to meet. Mr. Howe enlisted August, 1861, in Co. H, 42nd Reg. Ill. veteran volunteers, re-enlisted Jan. 1, 1864. He was in 40 or 50 skirmishes and battles, the first being Island No. 10, where the infantry had little to do, it being an artillery fight. At Stone River a sharp shooter got a bead on him, the bullet struck his blanket roll over his head, went through his blanket and overcoat, missed the button of his coat and the bullet knocked him as far as across a room and he thought he was done for, but after getting his breath and finding there was no blood running, he was up and into the fight again. Chickamauga was the hardest fight. In that battle his company lost all the commissioned officers, killed, wounded or prisoners, and all the sergeants except the fourth, himself, and he took command of the company. His company went into the battle with sixty-five men, lost in killed, wounded and prisoners one-half. He was a color bearer at Chickamauga and out of three color bearers and six guards he was the only one left and at one time carried the three stands of colors. He said the finest thing he ever saw was when Gen. Hazen, brigade commander, gave the order to his men to "forward" and the battle line in front of Missionary Ridge went forward on that command and carried it. In '71 he settled in Kansas and came to Portland several years ago and now at nearly 82 he is young in spirit.

Mrs. Gilmore's husband, John P. Gilmore, was a soldier, too. They were married the 3rd day of October, 1864, and he left the next day for the war, was in the battles of Franklin and Nashville. In '69 they located in Kansas on the state road between Kansas and Nebraska. After Mr. Gilmore's death, she kept her farm in Kansas and moved to northwestern Nebraska, where they were in the cattle business. Her home has been in Portland for 12 years, four sons, one daughter, twenty-four grandchildren are living and now at 79 years of age she has the appearance and the action of a woman much younger, as one equipped with the shock absorbers of life.

Last week one day Mr. Harnden and Mrs. Carmichael and son, Harry, of Fat Elk, were on the East Fork. Mr. Harnden runs his dairy ranch with a milking machine and a power separator, runs some sheep as a side line. Harry is interested in sheep and his father has given him a start in that line.
