Plenty of Water Found

A supply of clear, cold water, more than six times as great as Marshfield and North Bend are now using, was found by the delegation of Marshfield councilmen in the east fork of the Coquille river at Brewster valley Wednesday during an inspection of available water sites, says yesterday's Daily News.

Members of the council were favorably impressed with the supply and quality of the water but in the absence of any definite information as to probable cost of dam and pipeline construction and full information on other available sites, declined to commit themselves on the project.

The council will spend Sunday on South Coos river looking over the possibilities of this site and later will inspect other projects.

Erection of a dam on the east fork of the Coquille river, at a point just below the junction of this stream with Camas creek, was tentatively discussed as the logical site for a water storage reservoir if the Brewster valley project should ultimately be agreed upon.

This spot is 47 miles from Marshfield by road and about 30 miles directly east of Coquille.

No farms are situated above the proposed dam site and the water would be free from contamination since none of the land which would be included in the proposed reservoir has ever been cleared.

A number of sites are available for water storage in the vicinity of Sitkum postoffice but the one under discussion yesterday was considered most logical.

Despite the continued dry spell, the stream now flows approximately 7,500,000 gallons per day, according to the estimate of E. K. Burton, city engineer.

More Found Unfit for Use

They seem to be having all sorts of water trouble at the Bay, this, for instance, we find in yesterday's News:

Water from the spring at Midway on the North Bend highway has been declared "not fit for human consumption" by the state board of health at Portland according to advices received from the office of Dr. Frederic Stricker, secretary of the board.

The test was made Friday, on water taken by Dr. J. A. Burket, county health officer, and sent to Portland for examination.

According to Dr. Stricker's report the water contains 1500 bacteria to the cubic centimeter and is in class "C."

This report is in conformity with the report of Dr. H. A. Canfield, of North Bend, who submitted a report to the North Bend chamber of commerce in which he characterized the water as class "C" and unfit for human use.

Dr. Burket is in Portland attending a coast conference of health officials.

It is presumed that the state board of health will post placards at the Midway spring warning the public against the use of the water, but no such move had been made today.

M. P. Boy Scouts to Hike

A Myrtle Point press dispatch of Tuesday says:

A hike to the caves about 14 miles from here is to be made Saturday morning by the Myrtle Point Boy Scout troop. All the boys who can make the trip are to hike carrying equipment enough to camp until Sunday afternoon. Scout Executive Harris Ricksecker of Marshfield and J. S. Tomlinson, who directed the Coos Head Scout camp, will lead the hike. Rev. Omer Idose, scoutmaster of the troop, will probably not be able to be present for the full time of the outing. The purpose of the hike is to give the boys a chance to get ready for a Myrtle Point court of honor to be held soon.

Want Deer Season Postponed

The Marshfield Chamber of Commerce Tuesday went on record as opposing the opening of the deer season until after a substantial rainfall. With the woods in their present dry condition the danger of starting fires was too great to allow hunters to go out, it was pointed out. The carelessness of a single hunter might do damage much greater than the pleasure of all the hunters in the district would be worth.—Times.

SOME GOOD RECIPES FOR BAKING COOKIES

Children Need Something When They Get Home From School.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The old-fashioned cookie jar has a place in every home where there are growing children, for the custom of giving the children milk and a few cookies in the middle of the afternoon, when they get home from school, is based on a real need of their active young bodies. Growing children, especially those between twelve and twenty, are using up so much energy that an extra little meal of this kind is necessary to supply a sufficient number of calories. This is not the same as the tabooed habit of "eating between meals." It is a meal in itself, with a justifiable place in the day's menu. Particularly in the case of those who carry a sandwich lunch is that after-school meal valuable; if there is no way for the child to have a hot dish at

noon the milk may be heated or served in the form of cocoa. Wholesome cookies to go with it may be made by any of the recipes below, furnished by the United States Department of Agriculture:

Plain Rolled Cookies.

(About 60 Cakes.)

1 cupful sugar 1/2 cupful sifted flour 1/2 cupful shortening 1 egg 1/2 teaspoonful salt 1/2 cupful milk

Cream together the sugar and shortening; add to this the well-beaten egg, the flavoring extract and the flour, sifted together with the salt and baking powder. Add sufficient milk (or water) to form a dough just stiff enough to roll on the board without sticking.

Roll thin, from one-eighth to one-quarter inch in thickness, and cut into the desired shape. Bake in a rather hot oven until delicately browned, about ten to twelve minutes.

Peanut Cookies.

1 cupful sifted flour 1/2 cupful shortening 1/2 cupful sugar 1 egg 1/2 teaspoonful salt 1/2 cupful milk 1/2 cupful peanut meal 1/2 cupful shortening 1/2 cupful sugar 1 egg 1/2 teaspoonful salt 1/2 cupful milk

Mix, roll and bake as directed for cornmeal cookies. If desired, add milk enough to make a softer dough and drop by teaspoonfuls onto the greased baking sheet. Bake these drop cookies more slowly and a little longer than the rolled cookies.

Oatmeal Drop Cakes.

(About 50 Cakes.)

1/2 cupful sugar 1/2 cupful sifted flour 1/2 cupful shortening 1/2 cupful sugar 1 egg 1/2 teaspoonful salt 1/2 cupful milk 1/2 cupful oatmeal 1/2 cupful shortening 1/2 cupful sugar 1 egg 1/2 teaspoonful salt 1/2 cupful milk

Mix in the usual way and drop by teaspoonfuls onto a greased baking sheet, one inch apart. Bake in a moderate oven for about fifteen minutes, or until delicately browned.
