Count Shows Increase

Substantial increases in traffic on every highway is shown by the cen- sus count taken last Friday and compiled in the office of Division En- gineer W. E. Chandler. The figures are not only higher than at the same period last year but exceed those of last month, which were the highest recorded previously. Itemized totals for the traffic follow:

Half way between Marshfield and Coquille, 738; last year, 488.

One mile north of Port Orford, 447; last year, 204.

One mile south of Port Orford, 236; last year, 156.

North Fork to Shower Logs

L. F. R. Heller, who was in from the East Fork section Wednesday, says this dry season has cost him about \$1500, because the contract he had for the sale of his logs in that section has expired before he got them out.

He also says that when it does be- gin to rain in this country and logs begin to come down the North Fork, they are likely to be scattered from Myrtle Point to the bar for there are at least 25,000,000 feet of logs up in his country, which are awaiting high water to come out.

Another thing which Mr. Heller mentioned was the similarity of this season to that of 1861—he has been here 52 years himself—which his father told him about. That year the Indians started fires down near Cres- cent City, which swept 300 miles up the Oregon coast, destroying millions upon millions of feet of old growth timber, besides nearly all the wild life of this section. He says that it was at that time that Mussel Reef was formed in Coos Bay, the intense heat from the fires, and the ashes and brands from the forests cooking the mussels and clams which lived along the shore of the Bay.
