In 1921 he went on the milk boat Relief and moved to Coquille, his family of wife and two daughters coming up here in 1922.

He is survived by his mother and sister, who reside in San Francisco; his widow, Mrs. Georgiana Dibblee, and two daughters, Mrs. Philip Carpenter and Miss Carol Dibblee, and grand daughter, Betty Jane Carpen-

ter.

The Coquille high school football team justified the faith which the students and fans have in it last Saturday afternoon when it won from the Bandon eleven by a 7 to 0 score.

Playing the strong visiting team on an even footing for the first three-quarters, with several opportunities to score lost, they came back in the last period and by a combined aerial and bucking attack made a clean touchdown.

Lester Wilson did the punting for Coquille and had the better of Bandon's punter all the way through.

Earl Rice, at half, played a splendid offensive game, making a couple of runs, one for 30 yards. Tyler Walker was also making yardage whenever given the ball until he stopped Krantz, Bandon's halfback, with his elbow. Krantz struck Walker's elbow just above his eye and he was laid out for several minutes, while Walker had to retire on account of the injury to his elbow, Curtis taking his place.
