Old Lode Found

Lots of float has been found from year to year, but the ledge has never been found until this winter. W. W. Endicott made a location adjoining the "Lois" and has named his mine the "Number 13."

The find has started a stampede in this vicinity and very likely more of this rich ore will be found.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

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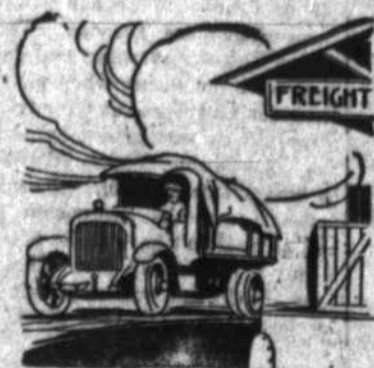
