Passing of Thos. Gaffey

Thomas Gaffey, of Reedsport, died at the home of his sister, Mrs. J. R. McGee, at Riverton, at 2:30 Tuesday morning, after a day's illness. His death was due to pneumonia.

The funeral services were held at the Ellingson Chapel here Wednesday at 1 p. m., and were conducted by Father Carrico. Interment was in the Odd Fellows Cemetery at Marshfield.

Mr. Gaffey was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Gaffey, who at one time lived in Coquille; also at Empire and elsewhere in the county. He was born in Coos county, July 5, 1878, and was nearly 46 years and six months of age.

Besides his sister he leaves three brothers, William and John Gaffey, of Silverton, Ore.

He had never married. Before coming down to Riverton he had been cooking in a hotel at Reedsport. He was well known to practically all the loggers for he had acted as cook at the camps for years.

Wreck Last Saturday

Four youths escaped with slight injuries when their car crashed over the highway embankment at Overland Sunday night, the spot where Frank Ferris was killed several weeks ago. Charles Gitt was taken to Richmond hospital to have his injuries dressed but was able to leave Monday morning. Kenneth Donaldson and the two Noah boys escaped with slight bruises.
