

Teachers' Recommendations

After being advised by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, the Oregon teachers, in session at Portland Monday, made the following suggestions as to changes in the state school laws:

Request for one new state normal school immediately, with appropriation to establish branch or sub-normal to meet present needs.

Adoption of free textbooks.

Installation of two high school inspectors under state supervision.

Revival of the optional county institute law.

Extension of voting privilege in school elections to all eligible citizens, rather than property owners.

Creation of a teachers' retirement fund.

Establishment of a state kindergarten system.

Change in the high school tuition system.

Robbed a Disabled Veteran

A disabled war veteran at Bandon lost the results of several days of tedious work when during Christmas week a shoplifter got away with a beautiful, silken-wool shawl from John Dickey's store.

The veteran had his spine injured during the war and in the rehabilitation school was taught to knit. To help supply his Christmas needs he knitted this shawl and left it with Mr. Dickey to sell. It was on display when the light-fingered crook lifted it.—Bandon World.

Sea Tells No Tales

No trace of the body of Andrew Dupree, who was drowned near the Cape Arago light Sunday morning has been found. Capt. Jensen with three members of his coast guard crew and Capt. Hermann of the lighthouse made a careful patrol of the beach Monday night at low water but found no sign of the body. They are very doubtful whether or not the body will ever be found. The sea has been quite rough since the accident and the body has probably been washed to sea, they think.—Coos Bay Times.

Will Resurface Sidewalks

The city of Bandon residents are no longer about the expense of repairing sidewalks which were frozen during cold weather, following announcement of Contractor I. L. Young Saturday that he would repair the damage without cost to property owners. About 200 feet of sidewalk were laid during cold weather and the concrete froze. Young plans to replace the tops as soon as the weather moderates.

Power Plant Rights Secured

Rights for the construction of an electric pumping plant and diversion dam on Ferry creek were tendered the city of Bandon by Mr. and Mrs. Elbert Dyer in a deed filed last Saturday in the county clerk's office. The instrument also gave the city the right of way for a pipe line and a 2300-volt three-phase power line across his premises in section 29, township 28 south of range 14 west. The named consideration was \$250.

I. L. Young, contractor on the Wesley hospital building, stated Monday morning that the concrete was not damaged by last week's freeze as it was feared it might have been. The sidewalks on the lower skyline boulevard were the only pieces of concrete work to suffer.—Times.
