

A Scout Patrol Conference

A two day Scout Patrol conference for Coos county to be held in Marshfield the early part of February, is the plan of Scout Executive Harris Ricksecker, who has returned from the conference of patrol leaders in Portland held the fore part of the week, says the Times.

The plan for the county conference will be similar to the one held in Portland, Mr. Ricksecker stated, and will be conducted by the boys entirely, with the aid of the executive. The four boys who attended the Portland meet with Ricksecker, John Budor, of Marshfield, Ennis Keiser, of North Bend, Stanley Stevens, of Coquille, and Mitchell Myers, of Myrtle Point, will have charge of the meet here, having gained knowledge of the plan of work at the convention. Scout leaders and their assistants may be included in the conference with the patrol leaders, assistants and scribes.

Much knowledge was obtained by the boys at the Portland conference and the meeting was successful, Ricksecker stated. There were about 200 boys in attendance, fifty of them coming from outside Portland. The local delegation made a good impression.

Some of the speeches made by the scouts in the meeting would do many older people credit. The boys handled the conference there and all the work was carried on by scouts. Topics were discussed by groups and then reports made of the discussions before the general meeting. Much good resulted from the gathering, the scout executive stated.
