### 30 Tons of Blasting Powder

Speaking of the big blast to be blown on North Coos River the last of the month by the Hauser Construction company, to provide rock for the jetty work at the entrance of the port of Coos Bay, the Times says:

There are about 30 feet of tunnel into which between 50,000 and 60,000 pounds of powder will be placed. This is expected to loosen up about 120,000 tons of rock for the jetty.

The loading of the big charge will begin Wednesday of next week and will take about two weeks. All of the material taken from the tunnels will have to be put back in place after the laying of the charges.

Work at the quarry has been greatly slowed up by bad weather, accord-

ing to the quarry office. Some bad slides occurred as a result of the rain and cold weather. The face of the rock was covered up in several places by mud and some time was required to remove it. The men try to get out two 500-ton barges of rock a day.

### Failed to Find the Loot

A Roseburg dispatch of Wednesday says that Billy Brown, aged 75, a resident of the Canyonville vicinity, was attacked, bound and gagged by an unknown assailant that day, who attempted robbery. He is in a critical condition at Deer Park Inn, three miles south of Canyonville. The assailant failed to find \$1500 hidden in the tent Brown occupied.
