The Coquille High School basketball quintet proved itself a strong contender for championship honors last Friday night when it easily defeated the fast Myrtle Point five, which had been counted on as one of the strongest in the county. The game was played at Myrtle Point before a crowd composed largely of home team adherents, but the visitors stepped out, and with splendid team work, both offensive and defensive, took the first half 16 to 5 and the game, 28 to 15.

Lester Wilson was the star point maker of the evening, making 16 of Coquille's scores. Are Pulford made 6, Gene Laird 5, and Simmons 1. Chuck Low, who refereed the game, said it was the cleanest basketball contest he had ever seen. And it was fast, too. The first half is described by those who saw it as well-nigh perfect basketball.

The girls' game which preceded was not so gratifying to Coquille fans for the Myrtle Point girls had a big edge over the visitors and piled up a score of 42 points to Coquille's 7.

The Coquille players were Alice Collier and Maxine Paulson, forwards; Katherine Peart and Fern Houdyshell, centers; Frances Nosler and Marian Norton, guards. At the end of the first half Wanda Houdyshell went in at center and Fern Houdyshell at guard instead of Frances Nosler.

The same evening Marshfield outtussled North Bend at the armory in Marshfield, in a rough and tumble contest, 15 to 13. It is reported that six players were laid out in one scrimmage.

Powers, which has also won its first two starts, defeated Bandon down there the same evening, 30 to 14.

After searching for him Wednesday night and yesterday morning, members of his family, found John Henry Harris, aged 61, dead in the barn at his home in Englewood.
