Wilson are graduates of Willamette University.

For three years Mrs. Rosa E. Glossop has been principal of the grade school building. The requirements for teachers in the grades are high, no one but normal school graduates with successful experience, if possible, being chosen. In the high school building the departmental Junior High School work is in the hands of Miss LaVerne Lamb, Miss Lena Crump and Miss Freda Cumming. Miss Cumming is president of the local teachers' association. Miss Louise Mattheyer, Sixth and Seventh, Miss Anna Lewis, Fifth and Sixth, and Miss Martha Seebaum, First grades, are also in the high school building.

In the grade school building Mrs. Launee Miller teaches Fourth and Fifth grades, Miss May Helen Hellwell and Miss Anne Hendrickson Third and Fourth, Mrs. Bertha Ditto, Third, Mrs. Belta Gage, Second and Third, Miss Jessie Cypher, Second, and Mrs. Inez Chase, First. Miss Vina Cronk will take the new First grade room in the basement of the M. E. Church South.

Coquille is fortunate in having a school board composed of public-spirited men who are willing to sacrifice their time to make the school system the best possible. The Board of Education for School District No. 8 is composed of H. A. Young, Chairman, A. T. Morrison, and C. C. Farr. Business affairs of the district are in the efficient hands of O. C. Sanford, clerk.

For a number of years the average increase of that school census was about 20, until this year, which shows an increase of 136 over last year. In October, 1923, there were 298 boys and 375 girls in the district between the ages of 4 and 16, a total of 673, and in October, 1924, there were 377 boys and 432 girls, a total of 809. School districts in Oregon with 1,000 or more school children are districts of the first class, and have certain privileges in making courses of study and choosing text books. If the school population increases in the next few years as it has the last year, Coquille will soon be a first class district. If that occurs in the next year or so, Coos county will be the first county to have three first class districts.

The unexpected increase this year has necessitated the employment of two extra teachers, and has resulted in general congestion in all rooms. In both grades and high school the students are crowded to the point that there is bound to be interference with the work. Four classes are meeting in the study hall at high school, with students studying around, a condition that puts teacher, students and those trying to study at a disadvantage. Several grade and high school classes have to meet in the basement rooms, and the new class of beginners has made it necessary to use the basement of the M. E. Church South as a school room. With greatly increased attendance in sight for next year, it becomes apparent that the problem of caring for the greater number will be an important one.

Schools are an important part of the life of any community, and new settlers in considering a locality want information on the educational possibilities first. Coquille stands at the threshold of an era of unprecedented expansion, and one of the strong arguments for this growth is the excellent schooling afforded here.

Men are changed to coyotes after death, the Indians of the Klamath tribe in Oregon believe, and they have so opposed the work of the government trappers that there are more coyotes on the Klamath Reservation than in any other part of the Northwest.

While \$1,000,000 was paid to the dairymen of the Coquille valley last year, there is room for many times the number of cattle that now are pastured, in its fertile valleys.
