

Power is developed in this station by the use of what is known as hog fuel purchased from the mills around the bay. This fuel is composed of sawdust and ground-up slab wood. It is taken direct from barges in the bay by conveyor to a specialiy deperts who have specialized on public signed fuel house. This fuel house the fuel is drawn from the bottom goods as a side line. 
