Would Be Some Airship

The Goodyear Zeppelin Corporation is now talking of building an airship of 10 million cubic feet capacity—or fully double that of the Los Angeles. Speaking of the proposed airship, Paul W. Litchfield, vice president of the company, says:

"If it is designed for overseas transport as a commercial ship, supplementing the steamship service by giving, let us say, two-day service between New York and London for that class of passengers to whom time is important and who would make many more trips a year if they could make the round trip to Europe and back in a week or 10 days. We may visualize a passenger cabin extending along the keel of the vessel with a promenade deck and steamer chairs, comfortable berths, dining-room service, shower baths and the like, furnishing a pleasant and easy journey without many discomforts of present methods of travel.

"I do not think anybody is in a position yet to discuss the cost of airship travel because the operating experience has been too limited to draw final conclusions."

Roseburg Won Both Games

Coquille High's basket ball team journeyed out to Roseburg Tuesday for a return game with the quintet of that city. That they were beaten by a score of 17 to 8 is no reflection on their skill for Roseburg has a very fast team.

Two of the fastest games seen on a Coquille floor this year were the contests last Friday night between the Coquille and North Bend High School teams and the girls teams of the same schools. Coquille won both games, the girls' affair with ease and the boys' after a hard fight.

The games were played on the Community Building floor and the new bleacher seats, which will hold over 800, were comfortably filled except at the west end of the hall.

In the girls' game, Coquille started off with so sensational an attack that, instead of the 10 to 5 or more scores which used to prevail in the ladies contests, the score was 14 to 8 at the end of the quarter, and 30 to 15 at the close.

Not in years, if ever locally, have two forwards displayed such efficient team work as that shown by Maxine Paulson and Alice Collier last Friday. They played rings around the North Bend guards and their basket shooting was uncanney. The rest of the team, Katherine Peart and Wanda Houdyshell at center, and Marian Norton and Fern Houdyshell as guards, were right in the thick of every play, where the ball was in their territory, and Katherine showed more agility and quickness than is often seen in any game.

North Bend, which is at the bottom of the teams' standing, showed a remarkable reversal of form in the boys' game, due to a great degree to their new coach. They were dangerous at all times but not quite fast enough to stop the league leaders.

Two field baskets were the only scores they made, except for five free throws converted, the final score being 20 to 9.

Both teams played a five man defense game, which tends to keep the score down, but quite frequently Coquille worked the ball down to the basket for an easy throw. The two scores Bill Nosler made, however, were not easy, for they looked to be at an almost impossible angle.

Coquille converted five of its sixteen free throws, while North Bend counted on five out of twelve throws. North Bend threw two field baskets and Coquille seven.

Referee "Chuck" Low umpired his usual good game, and you have to hand it to him for being square as a die and on top of every play.

\$20,000,000 Worth of Scrap

While the selling of transportation comprises the principal business of a railroad, the Southern Pacific Company during the last ten years has sold rails, metals and other materials amounting to \$20,356,866.00. This is revealed in a report just made by F. W. Taylor, purchasing agent for the railroad.

A check of the report shows that considerable track material has been sold to various industries for spur track purposes to aid in more efficiently handling shipments.

Another large item consists of second hand steel rail removed from the company's tracks to make way for the much heavier rail now necessary to support heavier loads in larger cars hauled by the monster locomotives of today. Most of this rail is sold to large lumber companies along Southern Pacific lines for use in extending logging lines deeper into the forests.

To Ban Outside Peddlers

Coos County Business Men's association would require all peddlers who travel upon state highways, to use such conveyances which may be licensed by Oregon, according to resolutions forwarded for action to Joe Dunn, president of Oregon State Motor association. The legislative committee of Marshfield chamber has endorsed the request.
