#### Selling Coos County Timber

A Roseburg press dispatch of last Tuesday says:

The Roseburg land office today sold approximately 12,000,000 feet of timber, netting slightly more than \$32,000.

There was a brisk bidding on tracts containing Port Orford cedar. One tract appraised at \$760 sold for \$1300, and three bidders raised the price on another 40-acre tract from \$1300 to \$1575.

The land sold lies entirely in Coos and Lane counties and is part of the old Oregon & California land grants, or Coos Bay wagon road land grant.

The purchasers were:

Omer L. Houghtaling of Bridge 40 acres in Coos county—\$2625.24.

Timothy J. Sullivan, of Myrtle Point, 40 acres in Coos county—\$1,550.

W. J. Conrad and A. E. Adelsperger, of Marshfield, 40 acres in Coos county—\$1300.

E. L. Culbertson, of Myrtle Point, 40 acres in Coos county—\$1575.

Dennis McCarthy, of Marshfield, 80 acres, wagon road grant lands in Coos county—\$16,350.

Dexter Lumber company of Eugene, 68 acres in Lane county—\$4,108.19.

Carl E. Fisher, of Eugene, 40 acres in Lane county—\$4,567.87.

#### Improving Highway Bridges

The state highway bridge crew stacked up the chips and shavings, accumulated while the Shinglehouse slough bridge was being widened and refueled, Saturday, and moved over to the Davis slough bridge and started to work. The Shinglehouse bridge is greatly improved. It is a little wider and the laminated decking makes it much better for driving.

The workmen began to remove the decking at the north end of the Davis slough bridge and will probably use the temporary truss span while renewing the bridge as was done at Shinglehouse. The bridge is to be smoothed out so as to be more nearly in line with the contour of the road.

Although the engineer has made no announcement it is believed that the China camp bridge will be the next in line. This bridge will probably be widened and redecked. Lumber has been stacked at the bridge at Delmar. It will be brought down to the level of the pavement which has settled several inches—Times.

#### Wharf Collapses at Bay

The wharf at the rear of Norton & Hansen stationary store at Marshfield, took the course of the "One Horse Shay" Monday morning, when it collapsed under the weight of a Marshfield Fuel company truck and dropped vehicle and occupants to the mud flats below. No one was injured.

Rotted and worn by years of service, the boards were unable to sustain the heavy truck loaded with wood and broke through for the entire length of the truck without warning to the driver. The engine was left high in the air with the rear resting on the mud flats. This was out at the time of the accident—News.

#### On Coos Bay 60 Years

W. R. Simpson Thursday noted it was just 60 years since he arrived on Coos Bay, coming from his old home in Maine directly to the coast, stopping six months in San Francisco. He arrived here February 5, 1865, and has since resided here, the place known as Old Town being his residence. Mrs. Simpson is an older pioneer than her husband, coming in 1859, crossing the plains in the Binger Hermann colony. Their many friends are pleased to know that these old time residents are enjoying excellent health, and congratulate them on the anniversary of their arrival—Harbor.
