The basketball game between the Coquille and Marshfield high school teams at the armory in Marshfield last Friday evening was one of the roughest of the season. In fact, it is doubtful if a game has been played this year previously, where almost anything went as it did Friday evening.

Coquille won 19 to 11 but not until the hundred Coquille fans present had seen, for the first time this year, a team come from behind and forge ahead of their favorites.

Coquille started off like a whirlwind, scoring nine to Marshfield's two in the first quarter. Evidently they thought it was going to be easy and during the next two quarters scored but one point. Marshfield, during that period accumulated nine points, making the score 11 to 10 in their favor.

In the last canto, however, the Bay boys were held scoreless while Lester Wilson was scoring six points and Rice two.

Coquille made six of their twelve

attempts on free throws, and Marshfield hooped three out of six. The latter scored four field goals, and Coquille six.

Wilson was the bright star in scoring, four of his shots falling through the cage beautifully. Earl Rice made the other two, one of them a hard one. Layton Nosler just missed one of the almost impossible shots when the ball rolled around the rim and fell outside.

The Marshfield fans were yelling themselves hoarse when the Bay team caught up and showed like maniacs when Referee Dirst failed to call fouls on the visitors, but there was very little to choose between the teams in point of roughness. Both did it and both were penalized once in a while.

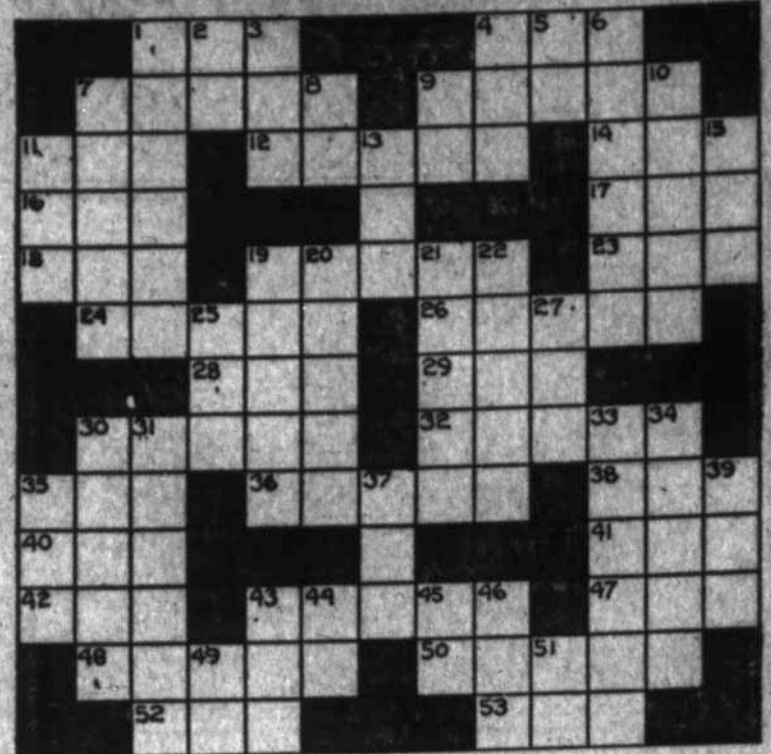

Got Her Goat

Discovery that she was 103 years old instead of 93 as she thought, is believed to have hastened the death of Mrs. Maria Hynes, one of Cleveland's few centenarians, says a press dispatch Wednesday. Mrs. Hynes was healthy and spry until a few months ago, and a grandson asked to let him see what her birth certificate, issued in London, England, looked like.

Finding it dated July 28, 1822, the grandson called it to Mrs. Hynes' attention. She became ill, members of her family said, through worry over the ten years' discrepancy and died yesterday. She came here from London more than 70 years ago.
