To Resurface the Highway

The entire section of the Roosevelt highway from Bandon to the Coos-Curry line is to be resurfaced immediately according to the program of the state highway department. This fact was indicated last fall by some of the engineers in the employ of the department and was no doubt the reason for doing less repair work on it than would ordinarily have been done, says the World. The project is one of the number in Coos and Curry counties on which the state highway commission will receive bids at its next regular meeting on February 28. The projects include the following:

Coos and Curry counties—Bandon-Denmark section of Roosevelt coast highway. Furnishing and hauling materials for 21 miles of surfacing and resurfacing work. Involves approximately 31,000 cubic yards of broken stone or crushed gravel.

Curry county—Myers creek-Burnt hill section of Roosevelt coast highway, 5.4 miles of grading, involving approximately 176,000 cubic yards of excavation.

Coos county—A bridge over the north fork of the Coquille river on the Coos Bay-Roseburg highway near Myrtle Point, requiring approximately 790 cubic yards excavation, 13,500 linear feet piling, 285 cubic yards concrete, 21,000 pounds metal reinforcement, 40 M FBM lumber, 125,000 pounds structural steel and 1390 linear feet trestle superstructure.

Curry county—Bridges over Floras creek, Morton creek and Willow creek, on the Roosevelt coast highway between Denmark and the Coos county line, requiring approximately 1100 cubic yards excavation, 5000 linear feet piling, 560 cubic yards concrete, 84,000 pounds metal reinforcement, 14 M FBM lumber, 195,000 pounds structural steel, 360 linear feet trestle superstructure and 539 linear feet concrete handrail.

Bandon's Refunding Offer

The voters of Bandon are to have an opportunity to decide on a bond issue for the purpose of refunding outstanding warrants in an amount of some \$41,000. At the meeting of the city council Wednesday night an agreement was made with Hattrem, Nelson & Co., municipal bond dealers of Portland, to accept a proposal offered by them whereby the company pays all expenses in connection with an election. If the election does not carry, the city will be no expense. If it does carry the city will place with the company the bond issue, the company to pay for printing of the bonds and all expenses in connection with the handling of the deal.

The warrants now outstanding draw six per cent interest and are costing the city that amount of interest each year. The offer of the bond house as made by the members of the firm, Weber A. Hattrem, who was present, is to accept bonds of the city which will draw 5 1/4 per cent interest on a 91.50 basis. In other words the bond house buys the bonds for less than par but at an interest rate three-fourth of one per cent lower than what the city is paying on its warrants. The bonds are to run one-half for ten years, with option of redemption in five, and one-half for twenty years with option for redemption in ten. The difference between the discount on the bonds and the saving in interest if the bonds run to maturity would mean a considerable gain on the part of the city over the six per cent warrants.—Western World.
