### Half Million Trout Planted

The report of Art Fish, district game warden, made at a session of the Myrtle Point Rod and Gun club, showed two trout hatcheries in Coos county to be furnishing fry for the creeks and rivers adjacent to the cities and within reach of all fishermen. The hatcheries on South Coos River and at Bandon furnished all the trout planted during 1924, according to the report. The total number of cut-throat, the only variety released, was 587,000, distributed in equal proportion to the size and length of the following streams: Myrtle creek, Lower Rock, Sandy, Twelve Mile, Middle, Floras, Seven Mile, Willow, Bear, Ferrey, Butte, and in Curry county, Elk and Sixes rivers, Port Orford lake, Brushes creek. Coos river and tributaries received 270,000 additional cut-throat.

Bas, shipped in from state hatcheries, were planted in Butterfield lake, 5000, and in the Empire lakes, 10,000.
