Suing for Son's Death

Suit has been filed in circuit court by Wm. Japanese Supposed Dead

More evidence that Uyumure Kin-suke, Japanese quartermaster of the steamer Asaka Maru, now lying in lower Coos Bay, lost his life while trying to desert to become an unlawful resident of the United States, has been found in the recovery of a sailor's sea bag in a cove near the lighthouse. The discovery was made by Walter Rehfield of the Pioneer Hardware company of Marshfield and he informed Immigration Inspector Chester Clark of his discovery.

Recovery of the man's body may mean a monetary saving to the owners of the Asaka Maru of \$1000, the penalty imposed for allowing an alien seaman to leave his ship while in this country.—Times.

White Cedar in Big Demand

With a five day mill schedule operative in the Pacific northwest and implied further retrenchment in view, it is rather comforting to consider the white cedar industry which has a most healthy promise for 1925 and appears to be opening a larger business than in any year since this timber became a gold mine for Coos and Curry counties, says the Coos Bay Harbor.

Men engaged in this line of lumbering do not hesitate to say they expect 1925 sales and operations to outstrip anything in the past.

In 1923 every corner of the country was dotted with camps where white cedar was being cut and marketed. With spring scarcely opening this spring, the number of white cedar camps, open and being prepared for operation are more numerous than in 1923, when small camps employed more than 100 men, to say nothing of the larger camps, where large numbers were at work.

The demand for export cedar is already greater than the supply, and more orders are flooding in. Many outside buyers have been in the county in the past month, clamoring for white cedar; one veneer plant employing several hundred people ran short of logs recently.

The shortage of logs and lumber will be relieved materially in another month, leaders in the business believe, when deliveries start from new camps and logs held in booms on Coquille river can be towed to loading localities.

The great quantity of white cedar necessary for the veneer plants make a big hole in the available supply every month and those at Marshfield will be using about 2,000,000 feet every 30 days by the first of April.

The supply, however, is to be amplified, as said by the addition of numerous small camps. The Western White Cedar company in early March will have a new supply of 100,000 feet daily coming from the south Coquille river, and now that the Smith-Powers Logging company has overcome the set-back caused by the November floods, this concern will be able to market more. The Stout company this summer will be sending out some of the finest white cedar in the county from South Slough.

Yes, it looks fine for white cedar operators.

Wm. Garrett, for years logging camp foreman for the Smith Powers Logging Co. until his illness a few years ago, died Tuesday morning at his home on South Ninth street, near Golden. Mr. Garrett had been slowly sinking and his death was not unexpected although a shock to the friends of the family.—Times.
