Ray Bowron a Suicide

"Ray Bowron met death by gun shot wound from a gun in his own hand, manner of discharge of gun unknown."

Such is the verdict of the coroner's jury which met Monday morning to declare how the young man, who was found dead in the Lakeside Hotel office last Saturday morning, met his end.

The tragedy occurred at six o'clock and was witnessed by no one, according to the testimony, although several people heard the shot.

Bowron had been depressed and worried for some little time, according to Deputy Sheriff Malehorn, who went over to investigate the shooting. The first report was that Bowron had been shot by some one whom he surprised in the act of robbing the hotel.

The unfortunate young man was placed on the morning train for the Bay but died before reaching the hospital.
