Coos Bay Asking for Railroad

To present the case of Coos Bay and southwestern Oregon in support of the proposed cross state railroad development program, James T. Brand left Wednesday for Washington, D. C., where he will appear before the Interstate Commerce Commission, says the Marshfield News.

At Salem, Brand will join H. H. Corey and Edward Ostrander, public service commissioners and J. M. Devers and William P. Ellis, attorneys for the commission.

The case is said to be regarded by the interstate commerce commission as one of the most important to come before that body in recent years and the entire commission will sit in at the hearing. The proposed railway development which is being sought by the Oregon commission under an act of congress which authorizes the interstate commerce commission to require railroad development upon a showing that a necessity for such development exists, is said to be the first case of its kind to come before the commission and is expected to establish a precedent in railroad extension.

Ask for Radio Change

At the request of the Coos Bay Radio Club, the Chamber of Commerce Wednesday evening adopted a resolution to be sent to Oregon's representatives in Congress, to Secretary of Commerce Hoover and Secretary of the Navy Wilbur, asking that an appropriation be made for changing the radio station at Marshfield from the spark to the continuous wave type so that there will be less interference in receiving concerts, lectures, etc., by wireless in this section.
