In Memoriam

Sarah Caroline Benham, daughter of E. P. and Emmaline Mast, of McKinley, was born in Washington county, North Carolina, March 9th, 1871. While she was yet a baby her parents moved to Oregon, coming from North Carolina to San Francisco by way of the then new transcontinental railroad. At San Francisco they bought teams and came to Roseburg, where they lived for two years, waiting for the opening up of the old Coos Bay wagon road. In 1875 Mr. Mast homesteaded on Middle Creek, near McKinley, where he literally carved a home out of a virgin forest.

Here Caroline, or "Callie," as she has ever been known, grew up and lived until her marriage with J. R. Benham Dec. 5, 1894. After their marriage the Benhams moved to Brewster valley. The site they chose for their home was on Brummit creek and so heavily covered with myrtle and maple timber that there was not even room to turn the wagon around.

Out of this ticket they cleared a farm, built a home, reared a family, and resided continuously until her death March 11, 1925, at the age of 54 years and 2 days.

Callie can number as her friends all with whom she has come in contact during her cheery happy life time.

Besides her many friends who mourn her loss, she is survived by her father, E. P. Mast, of McKinley; her husband, J. R. Benham, of Sitkum; two daughters, Zilpha Jane Krewson, of Sitkum, and Jennie Frances Krewson, of Dora; one son, Julius L. Benham, of Sitkum; three brothers, Lee and Fred Mast, of McKinley, and Jack Mast, of Lee; and five young grand children. E. A. K.

No lump sums will be granted to Marshfield hospitals out of the community chest according to decision of the directors and announced by J. W. McInturf.
