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

Two Oldest Residents

Our question whether any of our readers knew any older citizen than Anderson Wright, of Sumner, who celebrated his 92nd birthday day before yesterday, has been answered. A Myrtle Point reader gives the name of Isaac Nichols, an old soldier, who has lived in and near Myrtle Point for several years past, who will be 94 years of age on the 9th day of the coming August. He says he is willing to run the Sumner nonagenarian a foot race to decide which is the swifter of the two. Speaking of Mr. Wright the Marshfield News of day before yesterday, which was his birthday, says:

"Wright has unusual ability in remembering names of acquaintances and always has a cheery smile and a hearty greeting for friends. He is active physically and mentally, in spite of his advanced years."
