### Vote Not to Consolidate

A press dispatch from Washington, D. C., dated Wednesday, reads: The Southern branch of the Methodist Episcopal church has decided not to merge with the Northern branch of the church. By a vote of 141 to 127, the delegates at the 141st session of the Baltimore annual conference, Methodist Episcopal Church South, today defeated a proposal for the unification of the two great branches of the church. A three-fourths vote would have been necessary to carry the proposal.

This is of especial interest to the Methodist people of Coquille, as the principal M. E. South church in Oregon is located here.
