### Too Many Have Wrong Theory of Happiness

Happiness was not the direct object of a stoic's life. There is no rule of life contained in the precept that a man should pursue his own happiness. Many men think that they are seeking happiness when they are only seeking the gratification of some particular passion, the strongest that they have, was the contention of Marcus Aurelius. The act of a man is to be steadily governed, to live conformably to nature, and he will thus obtain happiness, tranquillity of mind and contentment. As a means of living conformably to nature he must study the four chief virtues, each of which has its proper sphere: wisdom, or the knowledge of good and evil; justice, or the giving to every man his due; fortitude, or the enduring of labor and pain, and temperance, which is moderation in all things. By thus living conformably to nature the stoic obtained all that he wished or expected. His reward was in his virtuous life, and he was satisfied with that. Some Greek poet long ago wrote: For virtue only of all human things takes her reward not from the rewards of others. Virtue herself rewards the toils of virtue.

### Musician Makes Plea for Melodic Glossary

Reverting to the elementary aspect of the question, I believe that if one were to collect as many as possible of the melodies which have given the greatest happiness to the greatest numbers, it would be feasible to compile from them a glossary of melodic terms such as would insure a melodic result with the same audience under almost any conditions, writes Evin Evans in the Margin of Music. That one might take the melodies which have given as much happiness to a more restricted circle, and add a list of terms the use of which was to be recommended only when the presence of that audience could be counted upon.

The composer who travels beyond these accepted glossaries will always be pronounced unmelodious until the new rural habits have taken root. So far as the best "advanced" music is concerned, it is melodious to those who know it intimately, and whose ear is capable of acquiring new habits, and it is unmelodious to those who either do not know it or do not want their habits disturbed.

A candidate for admission to it must be the son of a freeman, though a freeman's wife is made a freewoman on paying one shilling—the "marriage shilling."
