For in those same markets they have to compete with products from all parts of the country and when folks want Coos county butter and cheese instead of other makes, perhaps the other people will whimper, beef and bellyache, but I don't believe it just the same. When Coos county goes to the state fair and don't get a prize, there are those who whine that other counties got the advantage in markings. I did not read that Tillamook whimpered because Coos Bay Mutual Creamery got first on cheese.

A letter from my brother, Will, who has been in Florida this winter, says: "They have got an awful real estate boom in Florida. Never saw any thing like it. The whole state is staked off and for sale. They are selling everything from sand to water."

Six local men will leave Bandon soon for the Sandy creek section above Bridge to begin on a cedar logging contract that will take some two years or more to complete. R. G. Lewis, his two brothers, W. G. and Everett Lewis, and Clarence Davis, John Shields and Ben Shields make up the party. They have sub-contracted from Doyle & Lillie to log and deliver in the middle fork of the Coquille at the mouth of Sandy creek, 10 million feet of cedar for the C & C Cedar company, of which one half is to be delivered this season. Six miles of road must be constructed to reach the tract—Western World.
