## COQUILLE RIVER "SHINERS" ARE YOUNG SALMON

The following telegram from the State Game Commission was received by Deputy Game Warden Fish last Saturday:

"The so-called Shiners sent to the commission by you for identification, upon examination are classified under the identification of Silverside salmon. The classification is made beyond doubt. They are yearling Silverside salmon and as they run from three, six and seven inches in length, can not be taken lawfully in any manner."

Thus the state game commission bore out his contention that fishing so-called shiners of Coquille river was illegal.

Mr. Fish was here Wednesday and stated that he would strictly enforce this law. "I have given ample publicity to the law for the past three years and now believe that all sportsmen should heed the law strictly."

The most recent dispute arose, following receipt of a letter from the game commission that fishing for shiners was legal. This letter was written under the impression that information was being asked about real shiners. The so-called shiners of Coquille river have no resemblance to the real shiner, according to Fish.

The real shiner, found in the Willamette and other rivers north of here, is two or three inches in width, resembling somewhat a perch. There is no closed season on that shiner, and they are seldom more than six or seven inches long.

Fish further stated that these fish, during the season which opened on Wednesday, April 15, come under the same restrictions as to length and bag limit as any trout, salmon or other game fish.

### Coquille Has Paid Quota

The Coos Bay Times went out of its way to take an untruthful fling at Coquille. That paper stated that Coquille had dropped its support of the Boy Scout Executive with an unpaid balance still standing against this city.

A week ago the Chamber of Commerce here paid the balance due for the first quarter—somewhere near \$75—and intends to pay its quota for April.

This city did intend to give up support of the work of the executive May 1, but had no other thought than paying its April quota.

Since that action was taken, however, interest in the work has been revived at Myrtle Point, and a proposition has been submitted by the Marshfield council that if Coquille, Myrtle Point, Bandon and North Bend will contribute \$10 a month to the support of the work, the Bay city will endeavor to keep Mr. Richsacker or the job. He would not, however, devote more than one day and evening to personal attention in each one of those towns a month.

The Chamber of Commerce directors took the plan under advisement at their regular meeting Wednesday evening and will take it up later.

### Powers Woman Buried Here

Mrs. Blanche Carey, wife of Frank Carey, of Powers, will be buried in the Masonic cemetery here tomorrow afternoon. The services will be held in the Ellingson Chapel at two o'clock.

Mrs. Carey died Tuesday in a hospital at Portland, where she had been for some time. A tumor was the cause of death. She was 31 years, 6 months and 20 days of age. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Allen A. Fogel, are residents of Prosper.

Mrs. Carey many years ago was a resident of Coquille, making her home with Mrs. Jas. Thompson, now Mrs. Thompson-Stutz.

### Hall Re-elected President

Charles Hall was re-elected president and general manager of Coos & Curry Telephone company, during the first Marshfield meeting of the board of directors in the Hall building Wednesday morning.

E. C. Smith, of Hood River, and C. E. Hickman, of Portland, were re-elected vice president and secretary, respectively. These two with Hall form the board of directors.

Visiting directors were greatly pleased with progress made by the company during the past year. Two small lines, Sixes-Elk and Dear creek, were added to the system and more than 1000 new subscribers placed on the books.

Approximately \$175,000 was spent during 1925 and about \$100,000 will be expended this year. The new plant in the Hall building will give excellent service for many years to come but an additional section will probably be added in one year. The new system started with 1000 lines which cares for more than 2,000 subscribers.—News.
