RECLAIM WASHSTAND FOR KITCHEN USE

Discarded Piece of Furniture Made Useful.

Proposed by the United States Department of Agriculture.

Every so often one discovers that some article of furniture which served a valuable purpose in a preceding decade has outlived its usefulness, or given way to some modern household equipment evolved with modern ways of doing household tasks. One of the furnishings which long since disappeared from the city house and which is rapidly being banished to the attic in the rural home is the washstand that used to be seen in every bedroom.

Several of these bygone pieces of furniture have been reclaimed for useful purposes by farm housewives in Virginia where a series of kitchen con-

tests has stimulated much ingenuity.

in making improvements at small cost. In preparation for these contests the state and county home demonstration agents usually visited each rural home to talk over the possibilities for making the kitchen a more convenient room in which to work. It was frequently found necessary to look about and see what was on hand that could be made to serve a useful purpose without buying anything new. Discarded washstands, under their suggestion, were brought downstairs and transformed into convenient buffets, desks, and wheel trays. By the elimination of sides, drawers, and closet, leaving only the framework, the washstands were easily disguised. In most cases the varnish or paint was taken off, the surfaces rubbed over with sandpaper, and several coats of white paint applied, the final finish being enamel. This work was generally done by the farm woman herself. With the addition of casters the evolution of the washstand was complete, and proved very satisfactory. The picture shown was taken by the United States Department of Agriculture, with which the state extension forces cooperate in the work among rural housekeepers.

Give Children a Chance

The children of the State of Oregon, over two hundred thousand strong, who represent our state's future, need wise care and early training. The physical impairment of the coming generation depends entirely on the measures we adopt for prevention and correction. Although Oregon leads the United States with a low infant mortality there is still an appalling amount of unnecessary sickness and diseases and many others go through their childhood weak and sickly when by proper attention they might be strong and healthy.

There are, in round numbers, in the state of Oregon, over one thousand children who are mentally defective, and over one thousand who are handicapped with organic heart disease. Over four thousand children have defective vision; over three thousand have defects of hearing; over fifteen thousand have adenoids or diseased tonsils; and over fifty thousand have defective teeth. During the past year there were fifteen thousand, six hundred and seventy-four births in this state. One in twenty of these children will probably die during the first year of life. One hundred and fifty are mentally defective; over one hundred of them have organic heart disease; six hundred have defective vision; four hundred and fifty defective hearing; one-quarter of them have adenoids and diseased tonsils; and over one-half of them will develop defective teeth. By the time they reach adult life only one-third of them will be classed among the physically fit.

In a state as rich and intelligent as the State of Oregon we should have few children developing into manhood and womanhood with handicaps of remediable physical defects. The practicable problem of bringing up healthy children demands that each child must be carefully considered and all remediable defects removed. It is wasted time and money trying to force defective children through the regular mill of school work. Every child should have a physical examination before his entrance to school, put in the best possible condition, and maintained in that condition by careful supervision. We are responsible for the normal development of our children. Children are born without habits, but habits are soon formed and the bad ones come more easily than the good ones.

In order to grow healthy children a comprehensive and intelligent program must be adopted. Provisions must be made to insure:

1. That every child is well born.
 2. That every mother receives proper attention and care.
 3. That every child is protected from improper care and that physical defects are corrected before serious harm is done.
 4. That frequent physical examinations are made to insure normal development.

Poultry Notes

Provides plenty of clean nests for the laying hens.

Grade your eggs for uniformity in size, shape, and color.

Keep out the cracked, dirty, small, and very large eggs for home use.

Gather the eggs in a well-padded pail or basket and reduce breakage.

Use only sound, strong, standard packages and pack the eggs properly.

Sell eggs to a buyer who pays for quality or buys on a graded basis. When your eggs are of best quality and the buyer purchases them on a case-count or "nest-run" basis, you get less than they are worth.

Keep the nests clean and market clean, fresh-looking eggs. It spoils the sale of eggs when they are marketed in an untidy condition.

Use the small, dirty and cracked eggs at home. They have a lower market value but are entirely satisfactory for immediate home use.

Keep the eggs in a cool, clean, fairly dry place until marketed. Heat causes deterioration in quality and evaporation of moisture from the egg. Dampness causes the eggs to mold.

Rubber Crisis Threatens America; Firestone Seeking New Sources of Supply

HARVEY S. FIRESTONE more than two years ago predicted a rubber shortage, and said the British crude rubber restriction act would cost the American people millions of dollars. The British colonial possessions in the Far East produce about 80 per cent of the world's supply of rubber, while American manufacturers consume about 75 per cent of the world's supply.

Mr. Firestone has just returned to Akron, Ohio, after making a survey of possibilities of growing rubber in Florida, where he was accompanied by rubber plantation experts. On one of the tours of Florida he was accompanied by Thomas A. Edison, who made some important suggestions relative to new methods of extracting the latex or sap from rubber trees, plants and shrubs.

Rubber trees growing on the Edison estate in Fort Myers were examined, as well as those on the Ford estate in Fort Myers and the Ford farm near Labelle, Fla. A great deal of time was spent on the Government's Experimental Farm near Coconut Grove, Fla., where many varieties of rubber

trees are being grown. Some of these appear to be very promising.

"Rubber is of vital importance to highway transportation," said Mr. Firestone, "and is largely responsible for our business prosperity. The British restriction act now limits production and exportation to one-half of normal production. Rubber today is about 200 per cent higher than it was when the restriction act went into effect. Rubber restriction this year will cost American car owners at least \$100,000,000, and very likely \$300,000,000. Every ten-cent advance in the price of crude rubber means an additional burden of about \$75,000,000 to the car owners of the United States."

Mr. Firestone was instrumental in having Congress appropriate a half million dollars for the investigation of new sources of rubber supply, and he sent out several expeditions at his own expense to visit rubber producing countries, including the Philippines, Central America, Mexico and Africa, and he has today in Liberia, on the west coast of Africa, a complete organization operating a plantation and making plans to produce rubber on an extensive scale.

Last week a representative of potato growers of Eastern Clackamas county came to the office of the state market agent and protested against the unfairness of the new law, which he said permitted Yakima to dump its ungraded stock onto Oregon, while home growers were compelled to grade, stencil and have their stock inspected. A copy of the law was read to him and he was asked to point out the discriminating section. He couldn't find it. The law compels Washington, Idaho or any other state to do all that Oregon has to do if their potatoes are sold or offered for sale in this state. These protesters had not even

Imperial Handles Traffic

The recent statement that the Norma would be placed on the Coquille-Bandon run by Herman Bros., was incorrect.
