**Must Be Married Again**

Recently a young couple in Lakeside decided to wed. Both of the contracting parties are well known in their community.

The man journeyed to the county seat at Coquille and secured the necessary license. The couple decided to have a civil ceremony.

In due course the marriage license, as required by law, came back to Coquille and was received for entry at the court house. County officials received a surprise. The ceremony had been performed by the city recorder of Lakeside, Charles Romig.

City recorders, as a rule, though there are exceptions, have no authority to tie nuptial knots so the Lakeside official's authority was investigated.

District Attorney J. B. Bedingfield says Romig had no authority to perform the ceremony.

Nevertheless the marriage is entirely legal, though technically irregular, and just as binding as though performed by one fully vested with full authority.

Every one acted in good faith. The bride and groom thought they were being married in a regular fashion and the recorder thought he had authority to perform the ceremony.

Such is the opinion of Mr. Bedingfield.

Nevertheless, he had written the couple advising them to have the ceremony again performed, partly to avoid any unknown legal quirk, but principally to remove from their minds any floating suspicion that things are not as they should be.

Also a letter has been sent to the city recorder informing him of his legal limitations.—Times.

Returning from Roseburg Tuesday afternoon Sam Archer, 82 years old, veteran of the civil war, suffered a dislocated shoulder when the car in which he was riding went into the ditch near Bridge.
