**Californians Helped**  
An income tax decision, which, if upheld by the United States supreme court, will mean the return of approximately \$77,000,000 to taxpayers in California, was handed down at San Francisco Wednesday by United States District Judge Partridge. The decision upheld the constitutionality of the state statutes providing that husband and wife may make separate income tax returns, as against the government contention that community property must be included in a single return.

**Coquille Ranks Tenth**  
Coquille High School has been rated very high in the state in academic work in English, according to the rating given by the committee on English and Higher Standards in Colleges of the Oregon State Teachers Association. Every year the students who enter the colleges in the state of Oregon are required to take an entrance examination in English. The amount of required English work they take in their college course depends on the showing they make in entrance examination. For instance, if a student's grades are very high, the required English work may be omitted. If a student's grade is low, an increased amount of work, without credit, is required.

The Council of English Teachers of the Inland Empire Education Association have been interested in arranging for a uniform examination in the bare essentials of English, to be given to all entering freshmen by all the institutions of higher learning in the Northwest. Last year for the first time the institutions adopted a set of examination questions which were uniform and could show the effectiveness of the work of the individual high schools in the state and in the Northwest.

Last fall there were 64 high schools in Oregon which sent five or more students to Oregon colleges. These 64 were rated in order, the one in which the grades made by the students were highest was placed first on the list. Wallows High School, a small school in eastern Oregon, placed first, and Coquille was rated tenth. The first ten were Wallows, Commerce High, (Portland), Miss Catlin's School, (Portland), Hillsboro, Pacific College Academy, Albany, Lakeview, Roseburg, Washington, (Portland) Coquille. The other 54 high schools in the state, including Marshfield, 21, and Eugene, 23, rate below Coquille.

This rating is, of course, for the work done in Coquille High School last year, and this year's work will not be known until this year's graduating class enters college this fall. It is believed, however, that the standard of work here remains as high as before.

**Five Billion a Day**  
More than six hundred people have died of tuberculosis in Oregon each year for several years past. From seven to ten are sick for every one that dies. This means a minimum of four to five thousand sick in Oregon.

Associate these facts with the following statement from William Hallock Park, M. D., director of the Bureau of Laboratories for the New York Department of Health, and the need for a campaign to avoid spitting appears:

"When it is considered that as many as five billion virulent tubercle bacilli may be expectorated by a single tuberculous individual in twenty-four hours it is evident that even a much smaller proportion than are known to stay alive will suffice, in the immediate vicinity of consumptives to produce infection unless precautions are taken to prevent it."

He had about given up hope of saving the eggs when the pet rooster of the family took the nest, hatched the eggs and now has become a "devoted mother."

**Oregon Potatoes Lead**  
In the federal daily market price report of recent date the price of Idaho potatoes in Los Angeles was quoted at \$2.25, while Oregon stock was given as \$2.55, \$2.75 and \$2.80. This would indicate that Oregon's grading and inspection law is making a top place for Oregon spuds.

**Got What He Went For**  
Attorney J. T. Brand, representing the Coos County Good Roads association, went to Gold Beach yesterday to seek an injunction against Coos county, the county clerk, and the county sheriff, to prevent the scheduled election May 12 on the \$490,000 bond issue.

Portland lawyers have declared the election will be invalid if held and the suit for injunction is a friendly one, such legal procedure being necessary to stop the election. Plea for the injunction was made before Judge J. C. Kendall in Gold Beach Thursday morning. The case is carried to Gold Beach since Judge Kendall will not return to this county in sufficient time to hear the case. County Attorney J. B. Bedingfield accompanied Brand to represent the county at the hearing.

**Lee Duncan Captured**  
Lee Duncan, the Coos Bay thief, who was sent out to Roseburg last week and escaped from the jail there, was captured Saturday about a mile south of there. He was wearing clothing stolen from the Penney store Thursday night. He gave the officers a complete account of that robbery.

Twice officers were almost upon him, he said. Once they were in a cabin where he was hiding in the attic. Several times he saw posse near him.
