### Another Fire at Marshfield

Another destructive fire happily without loss of life, occurred at Marshfield just before noon on Wednesday.

Four families made homeless, others driven into the street, and property damage of \$15,000 was the toll of fire which destroyed two buildings on South Broadway and damaged adjacent ones shortly before noon Wednesday. One of the buildings, a two story structure, was owned by J. C. Doane and the other by Mrs. Cora B. McFarland and her brother, R. N. Baker, Los Angeles, Cal. The lower stories of both buildings were occupied by the Coos Bay Auto Wracking company, while the upper stories of the Doane buildings were used as apartments.

The homeless are: Mr. and Mrs. Guy Armstrong, Cecelia Chapin, Art Burkhardt, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Noah and their 9 year old daughter, Marie. The occupants of the buildings had little time to escape. Cecelia Chapin was the only person upstairs at the time. She smelled smoke and it soon began to roll in volume from her apartment. She dashed out leaving practically all her property, though volunteers dashed in and managed to remove a trunk, which did not happen to contain her most valued possessions.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Armstrong were away at the time. They returned to find their home destroyed. They had been married only a few weeks and the gifts bestowed on them at that time were practically all destroyed. Later, out of the ruins a few keepsakes were recovered, but charred and all but ruined.

Miss Chapin, who is an authoress, lost her typewriter and manuscripts which had represented work of many weeks.

Three minutes after the fire started the two buildings were a mass of flames and when the brigade arrived the building was beyond hope of saving.

The North Bend fire department arrived to assist in fighting the fire but was not required as by that time the local brigade had the blaze under control.

Ten minutes before the fire started Mrs. Sarah Wilson left her home, for a brief call at a neighbor's, leaving her daughter, Miss Spence Wilson, all in bed. When she learned of the fire she hurried home but had difficulty in getting into the house. Miss Wilson, however, had left.

She had not reached the street of the fire, and fell exactly where it started.

George Council, employee in Mattson Clothing store, was forced to jump from the window of the second story of the Wilson building, where he was assisting in saving household goods, badly spraining the ankle of his left foot.—Coos Bay Times.
