About the New Power Plant

The additions made to the Mountain States Company's power plant at Coos Bay during the past year were completed and the power turned on last Friday. Manager A. L. Martin states that the plant there now has a capacity of 5,000 kilowatts and that the additions just made to it represent an additional investment of \$730,000; while the ultimate amount it is planned to invest in the plant there, which supplies all of the cities of Coos county, is six million dollars. That will furnish 35,000 kilowatts of power for the cities and mills of Coos county. That is expected to furnish not only all the power needed at the bay but also for all the towns and mills of the Coquille valley, including Bandon, Coquille, Myrtle Point and Powers, for the next twenty-five years.

The next addition will increase the capacity of the plant by 10,000 kilowatts.

It is due to the foresight of Manager Martin, who has been the head of the Coos county division of the plant for the past eight years, that the present plans look so far ahead and contemplate additions that the growth of business in this county during the next two decades are expected to warrant.

The Mountain States Power company is one of the chain of public service corporations under the direct supervision of H. M. Byllesby & Company, engineering experts of Chicago, Illinois.

Coast Highway South

Bringing the information that another ten days would see the bulk of the Mussel Creek-Euchre Creek stretch of the Roosevelt Highway practically completed so that it might be used by the traveling public, C. F. Rhoades, contractor, was in Gold Beach the first of the week. Mr. Rhoades' outfit has been working throughout most of the winter regardless of the rainy periods, and it is now cleaning up on these stretches which the wet weather delayed. There are several places, where it will take at least another thirty days before they can be called completed, for real dry weather must prevail to permit construction work.

The state-highway commission, at its meeting in Portland this week, is to let the bid for surfacing this stretch with crushed rock, and it is believed that this work will start at once.—Gold Beach Reporter.
