NOTICE TO EXTERMINATE GROUND SQUIRRELS

By order of the County Court under date May 7, 1925, every person, firm, co-partnership, or corporation, residing on, owning, leasing, occupying, possessing or having charge or dominion over any land, building, wharf, or dock infested with ground digger squirrels in school district No. 27, usually spoken of as McKinley district, is hereby notified to begin at once to effectively exterminate and destroy all ground digger squirrels. This order operates in accordance with Chapter 127, general laws of Oregon for 1919 amended by the Emergency Senate Bill No. 22 of the legislative session for 1925.

The following poison for mixing and instruction for use thereof is the method most expedient and effective to be used for the extermination and destruction of said ground squirrels, to-wit: Mix thoroughly one ounce of powdered strychnine alkaloid and one ounce of common baking soda. Sift this into three-fourth pint of hot starch paste, and stir to a smooth creamy mass. (Paste is made by dissolving one heaping tablespoonful of glass starch in a little cold water, which is then added to three-fourth pint of boiling water. Boil and stir constantly until a clear, thin paste is formed.) Add three-fourth pint of heavy corn syrup and one table spoonful of glycerine and stir thoroughly. Pour the mixture over 16 quarts of clean barley, and mix well, so that each grain is coated.

One quart of poisoned grain mixed as aforesaid is sufficient for forty baits, and this quantity scattered along squirrel trails or on clean hard places on the surface about the hole will not endanger stock.

From the date hereof until July 1st is the most effective time to destroy the digger squirrel.

The county agent of Coos County, Oregon, has secured a large amount of strychnine and the other ingredients necessary for the mixture, and a quantity thereof has been mixed and is now on sale at actual cost, and may be obtained at County Agent's Office, Coquille.

shall within thirty days from the first publication of this notice, fail to begin in good faith to exterminate, eradicate and destroy, according to the aforesaid methods, or by any other effective means said ground squirrels or pocket gophers, herein designated, the county court of Coos County, Oregon, will appoint a person or persons to proceed with the extermination and eradication of said rodents, and the cost thereof incurred be assessed to such land, building, wharf, or dock, and unless paid, will become a lien against the same, for the extermination of said rodents.

This notice is published pursuant to the statutes in such case made and provided, and for two consecutive weeks or three issues, and all persons described therein are required to take notice thereof.

Timber Sales in 1924

Sales of Government timber on the National Forests of Oregon and Washington amounted to 704,386,000 board feet during 1924, according to figures just given out by C. M. Granger, District Forester, Portland, Ore. There were 1692 sales of government timber, valued at \$1,449,898.48. Of these, 757 were commercial sales, amounting to \$1,446,992.92; and 839 were sales at cost, made to local settlers and ranchers for their own use.

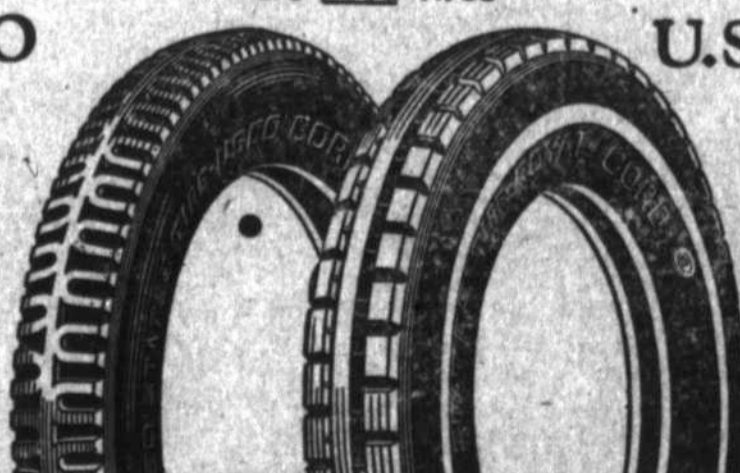
