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### Johnson's Car Turns Over

### More Contracts to Be Let

Contracts for work on the Roosevelt highway in Curry county will be let by the state highway commission May 28 and 29, according to announcement by the office of W. E. Chandler, division engineer.

One section is the Gold Beach-Hunter creek stretch, two and half miles long, in the Rogue river area. It calls for excavation of 74,000 cubic yards of material and 9,200 cubic yards of crushed gravel for surfacing.

The section from the Chetco river to the California line on the Roosevelt highway is slightly over five miles long, and will require excavation of 64,000 cubic yards of material. Fourteen thousand cubic yards of broken stone will be needed for surfacing.

A contract to be let in Douglas county provides for an overcrossing and approach for the Oakland bridge. This work will eliminate one of the most dangerous crossings on the Pacific highway.

Tenders will also be opened for supply of 90,000 cubic yards of broken stone to be used in repairing the Coos-Roseburg highway.

### M. P. Cannery Doing Well

A. C. Chase, manager of the Myrtle Point cannery, says that institution will produce 7000 cases of vegetables, 5000 cases of loganberries, and about 8000 cases of evergreen berries. These estimates may be exceeded but it is unlikely they are too high.

The cannery also has 15 acres in broccoli, eight acres in cauliflower, 20 acres in beets, 20 acres in beans, and eight acres in assorted vegetables. The vegetables will be shipped out fresh, with exception of the beans and beets.

### Were Caught in a Squall

W. A. Gilbert, Robert Ford and Miss Ada Ford, of Coquille were saved from drowning in the Pacific ocean Sunday when Captain M. P. Jensen and his crew rescued them from a precarious situation in a rowboat off the Arago lighthouse, says a Marshfield press dispatch.

The party went to sea in a rowboat to fish, but a squall came up and nearly capsized them. The men were good oarsmen and only this fact kept them afloat until they were picked up by the coast guard power boat.

### That "Hi-jacked" Liquor

"Slim" Forbes, who left the county ten days ago, after being the subject of considerable attention by Sheriff Ellingson and Deputy Malehorn, is one of the men tried for bootlegging at the last session of Circuit court, and on whose case the jury hung.

Failure to believe the testimony of state prohibition officers was the excuse given for not convicting Forbes, and yet he has been in the bootlegging game for some time.

His last operation was spectacular in the extreme. Some weeks ago he wired to a man named Finney in San Francisco to bring up a load of bonded wet-goods, as they would be needed for a special occasion about to occur.

Finney arrived in due season and reported to Forbes the evening of his arrival. The latter was too busy to receive the goods that night and so the visitor left it in his car. Next morning the stuff was gone, and a lot of comment arose about hi-jackers on Coos Bay.

Finney waited around two weeks for the thief to begin peddling the stuff but none of it appeared. The liquor was in bottles of a peculiar pattern which would have made it very easy to spot.

Soon after Finney left the sheriff received word that an auto load of booze was leaving Marshfield for Powers so the two officers waited at the Malahorn residence for it to come by. When it did they fell in behind and just out of town passed the booze car in which they had recognized "Slim" Forbes.

Forbes recognized the officials and shot by them, going into the ditch, and risking an overturned car. He skidded back and forth several times, being once almost squarely across the road. But he made his getaway after ditching most of the booze he was carrying. The broken bottles picked up by the officers tallied exactly with the descriptions given them of Finney's hi-jacked stuff. It gave evidence of having been hidden in the bay while waiting for Finney to leave the county.

The next step is to be the collection of the bonds, which Marshfield and Bandon men had signed for Forbes' appearance on his next trial for the old hung-jury case.

If the taxpayers want to pile up costs for Coos county by turning bootleggers loose or making it necessary to give them two or three trials, Deputy Sheriff Malehorn says that is none of his business, but he is going to get the law violators whenever he can.

### Field Tour in Coos County

Officials of the State Drainage Association have decided to carry out the suggestion made at the last annual session and hold the Annual Field Tour of the association in the Coos Bay section next month. Many of the leading reclamation men of the Northwest have indicated their intention to participate.

The general plan is to leave Corvallis and valley points about noon, June 4, and drive to Marshfield and North Bend via Roseburg and Coquille. Friday morning, 7:00 a. m., a chartered boat will take the party up the Coos River to view tiled and untiled tide land and drainage and dyking districts. Luncheon will be at Marshfield with the Chamber of Commerce. The afternoon will be devoted to a trip over Coaledo, Beaver Slough and Fat Elk drainage districts via Coquille and to Bandon for the night. Saturday morning projects south of Bandon will be visited.

The Coos Bay section contains about a dozen constructed drainage projects and many dyked and tiled farms, yet further drainage will almost double the productive capacity of this section. The Roosevelt Highway will greatly aid marketing products of drained land in the coast section and increase travel and consumption of produce.

These lands are wonderful forage producers when reclaimed and often pay for reclamation outlays in one or two crops.

Demonstrations and numerous brief field meetings are being arranged and several prominent, experienced drainage men will discuss dyke location, tide box, and interior ditch construction and under drainage for coast lands in the field.

### Reedsport-Scottsburg Road

Call for bids on the Reedsport-Scottsburg graveling job is to be issued at once, says C. H. Purcell of the Bureau of Public Roads. The immediate call for bids is planned so contracts can be let June 3, 4, or 5.

Action is believed to have resulted from the storm of protest that rose when announcement was made that the secretary of agriculture planned to lop off forest highway appropriations.

Headed by Reedsport, chambers of commerce through that section, telegraphed Oregon legislators and officials of the forest department, urging that prompt action be taken to obtain appropriations previously outlined for this district.
