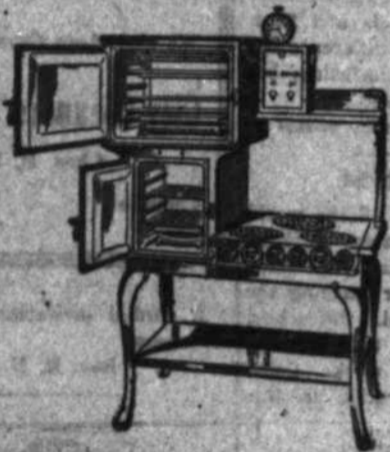

Bandon School Rumpus
