Decoration Day Observed

Bandon Case On in Court

The case of Axel Sandstrom against the city of Bandon, in which he is suing for \$7500 for the death of his son, Roy, was still on in circuit court this morning. Young Sandstrom was killed by a live wire in Bandon last November and his father claims the death was due to criminal negligence on the city's part.

Two of the blind indictments made by the grand jury recently were against John L. Aasen for issuing two checks without funds in the bank to cover. He pleaded not guilty and his case has not yet been heard, according to County Clerk Watson and Judge Kendall, who knew nothing of the story published in a Bay paper this week. In that it stated that Mr. Aasen deposited \$300 the day he wrote the two checks for \$40 payable to the Hub store here. Harry M. Fensler later receipted Mr. Aasen for \$25 to apply on them but failed to note it on the check, and Clarke Fensler, finding them still uncashed, filed complaint with the district attorney. The case will come up at this term.
